Resolution

Declaring Intention of the Common
Council to Improve Sixth Street
from Kinlock Avenue to the City
Limits.

The city of Klamath Falls, by its
common council, resolves as follows:
Section 1.—Whereas a petition has
been filed with the Police Judge,
signed by more than ten freeholders
of the city of Klamath Falls, whose
property will be affected by the im-
provement proposed, which petition
was presented to the common council,
having for its object the improvement
of Sixth street in said city, from Kin-
lock avenue to the city limits, includ-
ing all intersections of streets, and
the common council having directed
the city engineer to survey and pre-
pare plans and specifications and es-
timates of various kinds of improve-
ments of such part of said street, and
to having filed with the Police Judge
for the consideration of the common
council plans and specifications and
estimated the cost of several varieties
of the kind of improvement proposed
for said street, and said city engineer
having filed such plans, specifications
and estimates and the same now be-
ing found satisfactory, they are hereby
approved, and it is decided and de-
termined, and the common council
hereby expresses its determination to
that end, to improve said street with-
in said limits by grading and improv-
ing with macadam, oil surface, as de-
signed in said specifications, with
curbs southerly from Kinlock avenue
to the railroad track, width of im-
provement by macadam six surfaced,
forty feet for entire street as im-
proved from Kinlock avenue to city
limits.

That the plans, specifications and
estimates of the city engineer cover-
ing such work are to be used as a
basis for such work, and any contract
for such improvement shall be based
thereon, and the estimated cost of
such work and improvement, as sub-
mitted by said engineer, at \$24,748.00
is adopted as the probable cost of said
work.

Section 2.—The time within which
objections or remonstrances may be
heard against said improvement shall
be on or before the 4th day of August,
1913.

Leaders of Railway Trainmen Who Refused to Meet Wilson

W. G. Lee, president of the Broth-
erhood of Locomotive Trainmen, and
A. B. Garretson, president of the Or-
der of Railroad Conductors, have re-
fused the offer of a conference with
President Wilson on Monday, July 14.
Secretary of Labor Wilson had ar-
ranged with some of the officials of
the unions and officials of the rail-
roads to meet the President at the
White House to talk about amend-
ments to the Erdman arbitration act

which would make it possible for the
representatives of the men and the
roads to get together. Now the of-
ficials of the unions say there is noth-
ing to arbitrate.

A great strike on most of the rail-
roads east of the Mississippi River has
been threatened because so far the
railroads have refused to grant the
demands of the men for an increase in
wages. The last demand of this kind
was by the engineers, and it was
settled by an arbitration board.

cipal free steamboat excursions are be-

Commission. The excursions are an

they have been given.

nent. Wednesday and Friday of each
week the steamer Brewster Wells

street at 1:30 with a boat load of
wriggling, happy youngsters. The
