

BUILDING BEES REPLACING HOMES

THE PEOPLE, WITH ASSISTANCE OF THE CHURCH, ARE RECOVERING FROM THE EFFECTS OF THE FLOODS

COLUMBIA, O., July 15.—They are going to build at least one "building bee" every day this month in the valley of the Muskingum river—the mad Muskingum last March but peaceful and quiet enough now—and by virtue of this co-operation and assistance between neighbors and the financial help of the Red Cross, homes are going to spring up in clusters in all that rich but devastated district between Garrettsport and Beverly, below Kanawha.

The "building bee" scheme was originated several years ago by the Red Cross in Minnesota when the farmers who lost their homes as a result of one of the great forest fires joined hands and built up each other's homes. The principle of the "building bee" is simple. The Red Cross organizes a group of farmers, all of whom have lost their homes in the flood waters, into a construction crew and each man's place is visited in turn and a complete two to four room cottage with the necessary out-buildings is erected within 14 hours. The cost of the material which is supplied by the Red Cross from funds donated by the American people, runs about \$175 per house but in some cases goes as high as \$210.00.

That resilient spirit of optimism that has so frequently been shown in America following a great disaster such as the San Francisco fire or the Galveston tide horror, is very much in evidence in the flood washed valley of the Muskingum today. There in the aged bridge tender at Kanawha, he is over 75 now and a job close to a quarter of a century's standing was lost when the crest of the flood hit the bridge with an impact of many thousands of tons and swept the structure away and with it his monthly pay check. Not only did the relentless waters take away his work but they swept away his home and left him and his faithful wife without a roof. But the old man is still smiling. They gave him one of the first of the "building bees" held in the valley and now he has a two roomed cottage. The Red Cross supplied funds for garden tools and seeds and his garden will supply funds until the bridge is restored.

BIG HOTEL AT KENNETT BURNS

GUESTS IN BIG FRAME STRUCTURE FORCED TO FLEE FOR THEIR LIVES IN THEIR LITTLE NIGHTS

United Press Service KENNETT, Calif., July 15.—The Commercial hotel, a three-story structure, burned at 4 o'clock this morning. The hotel annex was also consumed. So rapid was the spread of the flames that about a hundred lodgers barely escaped with their lives, clad only in their night robes. The building belonged to Joseph Marconi, and the loss is estimated at \$12,000, with insurance of \$10,000.

ranch, where he was working, and which he was occupying alone while the Walkers were here attending the rodeo. He did not leave until the night of the 7th.

It was several days later before the theft was reported to the authorities, but since then men have been constantly on the trail of the youth. The looting of the home of William Duvall in Langell Valley, where Hettus was employed last winter, was charged against him, but he denies this.

When Hettus approached the Walker ranch last night there were several men in wait for him. He gave up without a struggle, stating that he had run out of food, and that he knew the posse would get him sooner or later.

Some are inclined to believe that instead of coming in to give himself to the authorities, Hettus visited the vicinity of the Walker ranch with the intention of taking another horse. The horse he was riding went lame, and Hettus, after hanging the saddle, bridle and chaps on a tree, walked the remainder of the time.

Hettus stated last night that since leaving the Walker ranch he has been in Alturas, Calif. He appears to be sadly misled on his geography, though, when closely questioned on this point.

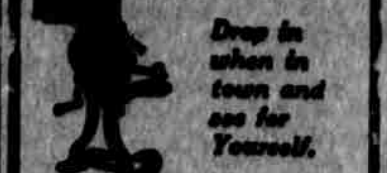
