BAILE REFUSED STAGE LICENSE TO CRATER LAKE

CAR IS THIRD TO REACH THE RIM OF THE CRATER

Local Automoblist, Asking Application Blank to Fill Out and Send to the Secretary of the Interior, Is Told That Only One General License Will Be Issued—\$20 Being Charged for the Trip

Although being informed by the secretary of the interior that a license to commercial automobile traffic in Crater Lake National Park is obtainable from the department of the interior, John W. Baile, a local automobilist, who is seeking a permit of this kind, was told Sunday by the manager of the Crater Lake company that he cannot procure a license of this kind. He was refused an application blank when he asked for one of this type.

Baile on Saturday, through Attorney Fred Mills, took up with Vice President Marshall and the department of the interior the matter of procuring a blank Sunday was in accordance with information received from Washington.

At present no automobile, except those owned by the Crater Lake company and those of Baldwin & Gordon, which are operating by permit from Parkhurst of the Crater Lake company, are allowed to carry in passengers that hire the car. Baile is seeking to break this monopoly, and has taken the matter up with the department.

The Crater Lake company contends that the exclusive franchise belongs to them, to protect their hotels and other interests in the park.

Yesterday Baile and his wife, accompanied by Fred Bremer, Mr. and Mrs. Bremer and Oscar Bretneman, drove to the lake in Baile's new Case, which, incidentally, was the third automobile to reach the lake this year. He made application for a license to carry passengers but this was refused. Instead he procured a season's license for operating a private automobile in the park. This license is signed by Will G. Steel as superintendent.

A protest is made against the Bulgarian atrocities. The Turks allege that they needlessly massacred people and burned villages around the Black Sea.
