RUSSIANS GET U. S. MACHINERY

CEAR'S DOMAIN IS THE LARGEST IMPORTER OF AMERICAN MADE HARVESTING MACHINERY ON EUROPEAN CONTINENT

WASHINGTON, July 21—Russia is now the largest purchaser of American agricultural machinery. Export figures of the Bureau of Foreign and Domestic Commerce, of the Department of Commerce, indicates that approximately 10 million dollars' worth of agricultural implements were exported from the United States to Russia in the fiscal year 1912, against 7 million dollars' worth to Canada, 6 1-2 million to Argentina, 4 million to Germany, 3 1-2 million to France, 1 million to the United Kingdom, and 1 million to Australia and New Zealand. The exports to Russia exceed those of any earlier year and form practically one-fourth of the total value of the exports of this class of American manufactures. Even these figures do not, apparently, represent all of the American agricultural implements entering Russia, since her latest official figures (those of the calendar year 1911) show importations of practically 12 million dollars' worth of American agricultural machinery, or nearly 50 per cent more than our own exports of this class of merchandise to Russia in that year. Russian official figures of imports from the United States are usually much larger than the official figures of exports from the United States to that country, this difference being presumably due, in great part, to the inclusion in the Russian figures of certain American products purchased in European countries.

The growth in exports of American agricultural machinery to Russia is more rapid, proportionately, than that to other parts of the world. Our total exports of agricultural implements in 1903 were 21 million dollars and, in 1913, approximately 42 million, having practically doubled in that period. Our exports of agricultural implements to Russia in 1903 were 3 1-2 million dollars, and in 1913 approximately 10 million, having practically tripled in that period. Over one-half of this total goes to Black Sea ports of Russia, approximately 1 million dollars' worth to Asiatic Russia, and the remainder to Russia on the Baltic.

Mowers and reapers form about one half of the total value of our agricultural implements exported. For the 11 months of the fiscal year 1912, for which detailed information is available, the figures of total exports to all countries were: mowers and reapers, approximately 20 million dollars; plows and cultivators, 7 million; threshers, 4 1-2 million; planters and seeders, 1 1-4 million; hay rakes and tedders, three-quarters of a million dollars. The total value of American agricultural implements exported at 10-year intervals has been: in 1912, 43 million dollars; in 1902, 21 million; in 1893, 4 2-3 million; in 1882, 3 3-4 million; in 1873, 3 1-3 million; and in 1863, less than 1 million dollars.

Health, cleanliness, comfort, beauty charity—are these interests less important than money-getting and hoarding?

CITY IS LEASED BY THE MOVIES

VERONA WILL BE SCENE FOR EXPENSIVE PRODUCTIONS, INCLUDING "POMPEII" AND OTHER BIG FEATURES

VERONA, ITALY, July 21—Contracts were formally closed today for what is believed to be the largest and most expensive motion picture production ever undertaken. The city of Verona itself has leased to the Cinematograph Company the ancient arena which compares almost in size, picturesque and antiquity, with the coliseum at Rome.

For the score or more of productions that are to be staged in the arena, the Cinematograph Company has already engaged 1,000 performers including nearly all of the best moving picture artists in Italy. City Hons also have been secured for the productions together with an assortment of tigers, leopards and other wild animals that would shame many of the American municipal zoological parks.

The first production to be staged will be "The Last Days of Pompeii." For a portion of the scenes the entire company will be transported to Naples in order that some of the scenes may be taken on the actual site of Pompeii, at the foot of Mount Vesuvius. The company will later produce a number of other historical films of a similar nature.

YOUTH ENTERS PLEA OF NOT GUILTY TO INDICTMENT. HORACE MANNING WILL HANDLE CASE FOR THE STATE

"Not Guilty" was the plea of Robert Pettus, Klamath county's twenty-year old desperado, when arraigned before Circuit Judge Benson this morning. Pettus was indicted by the grand jury, charged with assault with intent to commit a statutory crime.

The lad will be tried Monday. E. L. Elliott was named as his attorney and the prosecution will be conducted by Horace M. Manning, in the absence of District Attorney John Irwin.

Pettus, in addition to the crime for which he was indicted, took two horses from the Charles Walker ranch in Barnes Valley. He eluded the officers for several days.

Declaring Intention of the Common Council to Improve Sixth Street from Kinlock Avenue to the City Limits.

The city of Klamath Falls, by its common council, resolves as follows:

Section 1.—Whereas a petition has been filed with the Police Judge, signed by more than ten freeholders of the city of Klamath Falls, whose property will be affected by the improvement proposed, which petition was presented to the common council, having for its object the improvement of Sixth street in said city, from Kinlock avenue to the city limits, including all intersections of streets, and the common council having directed the city engineer to survey and prepare plans and specifications and estimates of various kinds of improvements of such part of said street, and he having filed with the Police Judge for the consideration of the common council plans and specifications and estimated the cost of several varieties of the kind of improvement proposed for said street, and said city engineer having filed such plans, specifications and estimates, and the same now being found satisfactory, they are hereby approved, and it is decided and determined, and the common council hereby expresses its determination to that end, to improve said street with-

in said limits by grading and improving with macadam, all curbs, as designated in said specifications, with curbs southerly from Kinlock avenue to the railroad track, width of improvement by macadam to extend forty feet for either side of the road from Kinlock avenue to the
