**NATIONAL CONVENTION STARTS TODAY AT DENVER—DELEGATIONS THERE FROM ALL PARTS OF THE COUNTRY**  
Called From Service  
DENVER, Colo., July 25.—Many of the crack motorcycle riders and most of the motorcycle "fans" of the United States assembled here today for the opening of the national convention of the Federation of American Motorcyclists. The meeting will be in session until the 28th, the last two days being devoted to a racing meet at Overland Park. Two thousand delegates are in attendance.  
The races will decide the national championships, amateur and professional, covering many classes and distances. Several thousand dollars worth of prizes have been offered. E. Armstrong, former Denverite, who holds the long distance championship of the Middle West, is the favorite for the distance events, as he has been showing tremendous speed in recent races. Many of the delegates made the trip to Denver on motorcycles. Many touring parties from Nebraska, Kansas, Utah, New Mexico, Indiana, Iowa and other nearby states are here.

## DOLLIES PLEASE A BIG AUDIENCE

LARGE LOCAL CAST PRESENTS TUNEFUL TAKE-OFF ON TOYLAND, DEPICTING A WONDERFUL DREAM

Something new and novel was presented to Klamath Falls folks last night at Houston's opera house, when "The Doll Shop," a musical pantomime adapted from the German, was given. The production was staged by a number of local people under the direction of Mme. J. Saiver of Budapest, Hungary.

The two scenes of the pantomime are laid in a Dutch doll shop. In the opening scene the ordinary day is depicted, with customers coming in to look over the many dolls on display. In the first scene, little Miss Helen Hamilton as the daughter of an English family at the shop to purchase a doll, and Dr. E. V. Morrow in a Dutch impersonation, have the leading parts. The girl caused a great deal of amusement in obtaining her parents' consent to purchase the "baby doll" instead of "colonial dolls," by means of a clever song hit, "I can't forget you, honey," addressed to the baby doll.

Dr. Morrow was a great funmaker through his attempts to master the mechanism of a Dutch doll, which he spied in the shop. The queer antics of the "Dutch Doll" automaton, played by Mrs. Carl Cofer, who ably handled the part, were well received. All the dolls in the shop carried out their parts to a remarkable degree, and deserve much credit for their conscientious efforts.

The second scene was also laid in the shop, but this represented the dolls come to life, doing all sorts of stunts, and having a frolicsome time in general, while the shopkeeper, Dr. W. A. Leonard, was enjoying a much needed rest in a chair after a hard day.
