**Tennis Expert
to Reform Rules**


NEW YORK, July 23.—Robert D. Wrenn, president of the United States Lawn Tennis Association, has sailed for England to participate in an important conference regarding the Davis Cup matches now being decided there. Wrenn will be present on the courts at Wimbledon to help the Americans. McLoughlin, Williams, Hackett and Johnson with his advice on tactics. Wrenn is a former, national champion, and as a scientific student of the game has few equals on either side of the Atlantic.
Although the purpose of giving his strategic aid to the American team has been announced as the main object of Wrenn's trip, he admitted before sailing that he would take up with the tennis authorities of foreign countries a plan to standardize the rules for the Davis Cup competition. The rules at present are vague in the extreme. Dwight F. Davis of St. Louis, a student at Harvard, offered the emblem for the world's championship a decade ago. Then most of the tennis interest was confined to England and the United States, where conditions are similar, and an elaborate code was drawn up.
The tremendous increase in tennis interest in the last five years has enlarged the list of competing nations, until this month there were seven with teams playing for the cup. Next year it is expected that a dozen countries will enter players.
The play has always been on turf courts, but there is no rule on the books regarding the nature of the surface, and the Germans, French, and Belgians have threatened to force the challengers to play on dirt or board courts if they win the world's title. American devotees of tennis think this would spoil the science of the game. Wrenn will confer with the heads of foreign lawn tennis associations as soon as he reaches England, and it is hoped that an understanding mutually satisfactory to all the nations interested will be reached.

**DOCTOR MISSING
FOR TEN YEARS**

WIFE STILL PAYS HIS LIFE INSURANCE, AS SHE IS UNABLE TO PROVE THAT BELLEVUE MAN IS DEAD

NEW YORK, July 23.—Nine years ago today the mysterious mist of the metropolis enshrouded Godfrey Louis Michon, M. D., Bellevue University, class of '87.
Never since that day has his wife (or widow), Mary Fallon Michon, seen him or heard directly from him. She has had clues at times—but not in recent years—but all of them have proven false.
With two daughters to support, Mrs. Michon went naturally into nursing, for it was while she was in training at North Brothers Island, where Dr. Michon was head doctor, that she met and married the man who drifted so mysteriously to the Port of Missing Men. With a natural love for babies, Mrs. Michon turned to that branch of work, and as near as she can calculate today she has ushered in and started properly on the road of life just 243 babies since that day nine years ago, when her physician husband faded away.
"I have long ago given up hope of ever finding him," she said today. "But I would give my right hand to clear up the mystery of his disappearance. I pay the insurance on his life out of my earnings every month—it now comes to \$156 per year, and you can realize that it comes hard. I may never get anything for it, as the officials of the Catholic Benevolent League inform me that death must be positively proved before I can realize on the policy. In all, I have paid nearly \$2,000 on the \$5,000 policy, and I shall continue as long as I can raise my hand and as long as this terrible mystery remains unsolved. Nine years is a long, long time. I guess it's only because of the dear little babies—I love them all—and because they keep me busy, that I can stand it."

Incidentally the instrument will be valuable for business men who find themselves compelled to discuss confidential matters in public places.

Paris Show Parliament

Declaring Intention of the Common Council to Improve Sixth Street from Klamath Avenue to the City Limits.
The city of Klamath Falls, by its common council, resolves as follows:
Section 1.—Whereas a petition has been filed with the Police Judge, signed by more than ten freeholders of the city of Klamath Falls, whose property will be affected by the improvement proposed, which petition was presented to the common council, having for its object the improvement of Sixth street in said city, from Klamath avenue to the city limits, including all intersections of streets, and the common council having directed the city engineer to survey and prepare plans and specifications and estimates of various kinds of improvements of such part of said street, and he having filed with the Police Judge for the consideration of the common council plans and specifications and estimated the cost of several varieties of the kind of improvement proposed for said street, and said city engineer having filed such plans, specifications and estimates and the same now being found satisfactory, they are hereby approved, and it is decided and determined, and the common council hereby expresses its determination to that end, to improve said street within said limits by grading and improving with macadam, oil surface, as designated in said specifications, with curb on both sides of Klamath avenue to the railroad track, with a sidewalk forty feet for entire street as improved from Klamath avenue to the

limits.
