AN OPPORTUNITY FOR KLAMATH

VERY few of the people of Klamath Falls realize the vast power and influence which is being wielded by the Central Oregon Development League in the upbuilding and development of Eastern Oregon. The publicity from the meetings of this organization has done more to attract attention and secure recognition and assistance for the Eastern part of the state than any other one thing.

It was the influence of the League and its members that made it possible to persuade the state legislature, which has only thirteen representatives from Eastern Oregon, against forty-seven from the Western part of the state, in the lower house, to appropriate nearly a half million dollars for the Columbia Southern project in Crook county. It also secured an appropriation of \$50,000 for investigating the resources of the state, which is of particular benefit to the undeveloped sections of Eastern Oregon. The appropriation of \$25,000 for agricultural extension was another important bill to Eastern Oregon interests, which was passed through the support of the members of the League, as was also the memorial to congress, asking for an extension of time for payments on government projects, and which undoubtedly has had considerable to do in determining the favorable attitude of the secretary of the interior.

If the people here could only realize what the meeting of the Central Oregon Development League in Klamath Falls in August meant for this city and for the entire Klamath country, every man and woman would begin at once laying plans to make this one of the greatest meetings of the League ever held.

Klamath Falls as a meeting place has a great advantage over other towns in Central Oregon. After traveling hundreds of miles through vast stretches of sage brush, mountain and practically undeveloped country, the large number of visitors to Klamath Falls can be shown our beautiful valleys in a comparatively developed stage. In addition we have better accommodations in every respect as well as unsurpassed mountain and lake scenery, which are bound to create a lasting and favorable impression. It remains for the people of Klamath Falls to welcome these visitors in a manner befitting the importance of the gathering.

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BUD AND RIVERS MAY MEET NEXT

BROTHER FRED TELLS PORTLAND PEOPLE THAT VANCOUVER, BRITISH WAS IN FEARFUL CONDITION WHEN HE LOST

That Bud Anderson will be even better as a boxer when he crawls into the ring again about Thanksgiving Day, is the information brought to Portland by Freddie Anderson, his brother and chief sparring partner, who arrived yesterday. Fred says Bud was due to leave the hospital at Santa Monica, where he underwent an operation for appendicitis right after his defeat at the hands of Louch Choss on July 4. Freddie says that Uncle Tom McCarey is now figuring on matching Bud and Joe Rivers for his Turkey Day date, figuring that the two with their big following in Los Angeles ought to make him a more profitable house than even a championship fight.

"Dr. Thomas, who removed Bud's appendix," said Freddie, "expressed surprise that Bud should have been able to crawl into the ring with Cross in the condition he was in. The doctor said the condition of the appendix showed Bud had suffered four distinct attacks in about six months without knowing it. He had a slight attack while we were in vaudeville here, but we thought it stomach disorder. The appendix, which was removed through an opening three-quarters of an inch in length, was about five inches long and the contraction about three times the size of an olive seed, and as hard as a stone. It was said to have been the most successful operation ever performed at Santa Monica. Dr. Thomas spread the muscles, instead of cutting them, and then sewed them back over the incision, giving a double layer of muscle covering. The doctor says Bud ought to fight better than at any time in his life, and be far stronger than before.

"Bud can beat Cross. Cross is a shade better fighter than Mandot. He has a good right hand, but he can't stand body punishment. He is a clever fellow, and can hit hard, but not as hard as Bud. Bud figures that he got hit over the appendix in the first round of the fight, and in inflamed the member and further sapped his strength.

"Bud bought an automobile for our mother so that she can visit him daily at the ranch.

"And here's where I come in for a little space. I got married July 5 at Los Angeles to Miss Louise Green of Palms, Calif., near Los Angeles. Her father has been in the mercantile business, but together we are going into the garage business at San Diego, and I shall make my home there in about six weeks."

"See America First" Clubs Will be Organized to Explain Local Wonders and Scenes to Tourists

PORTLAND, July 24.—To keep at home at least a portion of the half billion dollars which, according to government statistics, is being spent annually by Americans seeking health and pleasure in foreign countries, congress and President Wilson will, in the near future, be requested formally to create a national tourist and travel commission as a permanent federal board, the purpose of which will be the advancement of the "See America First" movement.

Plans with this idea in view are being prepared today by George L. Hutchins, president of the Festivals Association of the Pacific Coast, an organization made up of the executive officers of the festivals and carnivals held annually by various municipalities of the Pacific Coast. When the plans are perfected they will be put in the form of a memorial to congress and the president, pointing out the advantages of such a commission, and urging its immediate creation.
