**GIANTS HAVE BEEN STEADILY
WORKING FOR THE HUNTING.
ENGLISH BASEBALL IN WHEED
SPORT**

NEW YORK, July 24—The Hon-
orable J. McGraw, known as the "Little
Napoleon," but whose real title is
manager of the New York Giants, is
about in a position to murmur "I told
you so." While the Pittsburgh Pirates
were floundering in the second divi-
sion and sending men to the hospital
just as fast as they climbed into uni-
form, McGraw insisted that it would
be the Pirates he would have to beat
in the final dash for the pennant.

From April on through June the
Pirates refused to respond to the
call. The machine simply wouldn't
open up and show speed. It was
bumped by everyone, including hum-
ble Boston and lowly Cincinnati. But
early July saw the worm begin to
turn. There wasn't any change in the
material. The same parts were
in use, but as the team began to patch
itself together it began to kick up
smoke. It jumped from the second
to the first division in a little more
than a week, and it now has the stuff
to whip up even faster through the
dog days.

In the meantime Brooklyn was
dropping ten straight, which helped
considerably, and the Pirates passed
the stumbling Dodgers, who had ap-
parently shot their bolt, and are now
ready to give up the ghost.

The Giants had snatched off the
lead from the Phillies before the Pi-
rates got under way in their sprint
toward daylight, and had an impos-
sible lead established. The Cubs and
Phillies will have to keep full steam
ahead if they maintain a position
over Clark's crew.

Although McGraw believes—at
least he says he believes it—that it
is the Pirates he will have to beat out
for the old flag, he doesn't admit hav-
ing lost any sleep over it.

to mention some of the boys on our
own shores, in the account of a re-
cent cricket game. As a run getter
and batter the wonderful Ty Cobb is
a pitcher compared to a phenom devel-
oped in England. Brand of Somers-
et, in a recent game, batted for three

hours and forty-five minutes before
he was put out. He scored 357 runs
in that time. He's a cricket player.
This may explain why they have mil-
lions of suffragettes in England.

Baseball acts like a tonic in this
little old realm of ours. Who—as
our famous old crab friend, Ben

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LOCAL LUMBER TRADE BOOMING

**HUNDRED MILLION FEET OF
WHITE PINE WILL BE PRODUCED
HERE THIS YEAR, SAYS
"THE TIMBERMAN"**

The following trade review of the
Klamath country is contained in the
current issue of "The Timberman":
The new white pine section of the
West, centered in and tributary to
Klamath Falls, is making rapid de-
velopment. Approximately 100,000,
000 feet will be produced there this
year.

The low grades are practically all
worked up locally into box material
and the upper grades are moved to
the Eastern trade, with fairly good
demand.

Approximately 30,000,000,000 feet
of timber is tributary to the Klamath
Basin.

Development of the entire section
through the medium of irrigation pro-
jects and transportation facilities, ag-
ricultural possibilities, stock raising
and summer resorts has shown a
marked advance during the past year.

Industrial development, in a manu-
facturing way, is making substantial
gains.

walk grade) 176.
Pine street, N. E. corner (side
walk grade) 176.
High street, south side 175.
High street, north side 175.
Canal street, north side 176.
Canal street, south side 176.
Bush street, north side 175.5
Bush street, south side 175.5
Washington street, north side 155.
Washington street, south side 155.
Franklin street, north side 155.
Franklin street, south side 155.

And He It Further Resolved, that
this resolution be kept on file in the
office of the City Recorder as provided
by the charter, and that this resolu-
tion shall be published in the city

Resolution
Declaring Intention of the Common
Council to Improve Sixth Street
from Kinlock Avenue to the City
Limits.

The city of Klamath Falls, by its
common council, resolves as follows:
Section 1.—Whereas a petition has
been filed with the Police Judge,
signed by more than ten freeholders
of the city of Klamath Falls, whose
property will be affected by the im-
provement proposed, which petition
was presented to the common council,
having for its object the improvement
of Sixth street in said city, from Kin-
lock avenue to the city limits, includ-
ing all intersections of streets, and
the common council having directed
the city engineer to survey and pre-
pare plans and specifications and es-
timates of various kinds of improve-
ments of such part of said street, and
he having filed with the Police Judge
for the consideration of the common
council plans and specifications and
estimated the cost of several varieties
of the kind of improvement proposed
for said street, and said city engineer
having filed such plans, specifications
and estimates and the same now be-
ing found satisfactory, they are her-
by approved, and it is decided and de-
termined, and the common council
hereby expresses its determination to
that end, to improve said street with
said limits by grading and improv-
ing with macadam, off surface, as de-
signated in said specifications, with
curbs south of said Klamath avenue
to the railroad track, with the im-
provement by macadam as heretofore
done for said street as improved from
Klamath avenue to the

Each bid must be submitted in a
certified check on some bank or
bank for five per cent of the bid,
and, if successful, will be required to
contract with the city for the im-
provement. The city engineer
shall have the right to reject any
bid.

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
