COMING MEETING TO BE A WINNER

The visitors were entertained at a banquet at the White Pelican hotel last evening. Hunter Savidge, president of the Chamber of Commerce, acted as toastmaster, and an address of welcome was delivered by County Judge Worden, who also took occasion to impress on the people of Klamath Falls the vast importance of the fourth annual meeting of the Central Oregon Development League to be held in Klamath Falls August 19, 20 and 21.

Phil S. Bates, publisher of the Pacific Northwest, and special representative of C. C. Chapman, secretary of the Portland Commercial Club, told how the club had raised \$150,000, which was to be spent in the next three years in bringing people from the East and settling up the undeveloped sections of Oregon. He also told of the trip of the "Flying Squadron" through Eastern Oregon. He stated that meetings were held at every postoffice and settlement on the trip, and that delegates had been named from all of these places to attend the meeting in Klamath Falls.

"Lakaview," said Mr. Bates, "will send a large delegation here, and as both Bend and Redmond are after the next meeting of the League, you can depend on a large number of visitors from Crook County." Mr. Bates paid a high tribute to the magnificent system of good roads throughout Eastern Oregon, and particularly those in Klamath county.

"The Oregon Agricultural college will be represented by the largest delegation ever sent out to one of these meetings," said Dean A. R. Cordley, who spoke of the application of the new law for agricultural extension work. He stated that the new law for which an appropriation of \$25,000 had been made, provided for co-operation between the counties, the state and the college. Counties desiring demonstration farms can secure the assistance of the college by providing a fund of \$2,000. The state will contribute a like amount, and the college and government \$1,000. This gives a total fund of \$5,000 to be expended within the county. He called attention to the fact that Klamath county had 90,000 acres classed as cultivated and over 700,000 untitled, which was proof of the necessity of education along the line of the use of land.

Other speakers of the evening were J. Frank Adams, Rev. Geo. H. Fosse, Geo. T. Baldwin, R. H. Crozier of the Seattle, Portland and Spokane railroad; S. O. Johnson, E. B. Hall and L. M. Foss of the O.-W. R. & N.

The visitors were taken by boat to Pelican Bay this morning, where they will spend the day and night. Tomorrow they will have breakfast at the Worden ranch, and after a short time in Fort Klamath will proceed on their way to Crescent and Bend.

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BRITISH OFFICER CONFIRMS CHARGE

SAYS BODIES OF CHILDREN INDICATE THAT THEY WERE TOSSED IN THE AIR AND IMPALED ON BAYONETS

ATHENS, July 24.—Commander Cardale of the British navy today confirmed the charges of atrocities by Bulgarian troops. He said that he personally counted 1,200 corpses of old men, women and children at Doxato.

Many of the children's bodies were pierced through in several places. Cardale said this indicated that the Bulgarians tossed the children in the air and caught them on bayonet points.

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
