

NON-MILITANTS INVADE LONDON

THOUSANDS OF WOMEN HAVE MARCHED FROM DIFFERENT PARTS OF THE ISLAND TO PARTICIPATE IN DEMONSTRATION

LONDON, July 25.—The advance guard of what is expected to be the greatest woman suffrage demonstration England has ever seen, arrived in the British capital today. The demonstration will start tomorrow. The women are coming here to demand the vote. None of those included in the demonstration are members of the militant women's social and political union. All are opposed to militant methods. The non-militant organizations represented have a total membership of nearly 500,000. Many of those who will arrive tomorrow have "hiked" all the way to London. Some of them have walked 300 miles, having started the pilgrimage weeks ago. Mrs. Millicent G. Fawcett, the president of the national union, will preside at all meetings.

LUNCH COSTS A CENT AT BARS

MATTER IS LEFT TO CUSTOMER'S HONOR AND NOBODY HAS BEEN ARRESTED FOR STEALING A BIAL

ST. LOUIS, July 25.—It has been just one month today since the anti-free lunch law went into effect here, and every one is agreed that there might as well not be any law.

Practically every saloon in the city sells a pretty fair lunch for one cent. Others have placed slot machines near the bars with placards calling attention to the law, and asking beer buyers to drop pennies in the slot if they get away with any of the food.

In one downtown saloon, one of the biggest in town, an inquisitive patron counted four cents in one of the pay-as-you-eat money boxes just after several hundred hungry and thirsty baseball fans, returning from a ball game, had eaten everything on the lunch counter. During the time the crowd was in the saloon, the attendant behind the lunch counter was busy elsewhere.

In some of the saloons the proprietors insist on the payment of the penny, but the customer gets a ticket which he doesn't have to turn in at the lunch counter, and which can be carried about and used as a sort of "rain check" ticket.

Nobody has been arrested yet for swiping a few hot dogs and cheese.

Forty thousand fingerling trout from the Spencer Creek hatchery were taken to Spring Creek Wednesday by Deputy Game Warden U. M. Ramsby. The trout were brought by auto from Spencer Creek to Klamath Falls by Don Lytle, and were then transferred to J. A. Thompson's auto and taken to Spring Creek.

This is the first trout planted in Spring Creek this season.

Over 100,000 trout from the Spencer Creek hatchery have been distributed in the streams of Klamath county this year. The work of distribution will continue for some time yet, and Mr. Ramsby states that he intends to stock some of the streams where there are no trout at the present time.

In time he hopes to have every stream and body of water in Klamath county well supplied with fish.

Pacific Coast Tennis Star Loses; Williams Is Victor

WIMBLEDON, England, July 24.—Maurice McLaughlin, the phenomenal Pacific Coast member of the American tennis team entered in the Davis Cup competition, was defeated in the first singles today by Parke of the English team.

R. Norris Williams, the collegian member of the American team, was more fortunate. He defeated Dixon in five sets.

McLaughlin failed to show the form today that he displayed in all of his previous English matches. His service was erratic, there were several double faults and his backhand returns were very weak.

Williams won his first set, 6-5; Dixon took the second, 6-3; Williams bested the Englishman, 6-3, in the third; the fourth went to Dixon, 6-3, and in the last set, Williams won, 7-6.

The McLaughlin-Parke score was as follows: McLaughlin, 10-8; Parke, 7-5; Parke, 6-4; McLaughlin, 6-1; Parke, 7-5.
