SOME HAY HIT BY RAINSTORM

**MERRILL FARMERS LOOK FOR A
BIG YEAR—DRY FARMERS LIK-
ED DOWNPOUR—OTHER MER-
RILL NEWS NOTES**

(Special Correspondence)
MERRILL, Ore., July 27—At least
four inches of rain have fallen here
during the past few days. Consider-
able hay that was on the ground and
stacked preparatory to being hauled
and stacked has soured.
While the hay will be rusty for
feeding the farmers' stock this winter,
yet it will be utilized to good advan-
tage. To those who have already
completed harvesting their crops the
rain did not damage, but proved ben-
eficial.

The farmers who live on dry farms
and rely on rains for irrigation are
rejoicing over the recent rains in bet-
tering their wheat, which is not cut,
fifty per cent or over.

From various reports throughout
this part of the country it is under-
stood that the yield in production of
wheat, alfalfa, oats, barley and rye,
etc., will be much larger this season
than in any previous years.

If the farmers can market their
productions to good advantage this
Fall there is no doubt that those very
same farmers will come nearer mak-
ing both ends meet later than has
happened in a long time.

The new town of Bradnack, just
over the line a few miles from here, is
reported to have a postoffice. It is
understood that Geo. Bradnack, for-
merly of Klamath Falls, has received
his commission as postmaster of that
village.

A school house is to be built there
soon. It is likely that the dwelling
of learning will be started in a short
time so as to have the building ready
for occupancy by the time that the
winter term of school is scheduled to
commence.

A branch of the Ashland Fruit
Store has been established in Merrill.
The demand for fruit in this section
made it profitable for the Ashland
Fruit Growers' Association of Ash-
land, to start the new enterprise in
this city.

Over fifty per cent of those who
were susceptible to the mumps or the

citizens in this city and community
for the past three months have al-
ready had the disease or are now con-
fined to their homes from the malady.
Only in a few cases has the mumps
affected its victim to a great extent.

TO FORECAST FOREST FIRE

**WARNINGS WILL BE SENT OUT
THROUGHOUT OREGON WHEN
HOT DRY WINDS ARE EXPECT-
ED—ARRANGE SYSTEM**

PORTLAND, July 28—The West-
ern Forestry & Conservation Associa-
tion representing the patrol organi-
zations of the Pacific Coast, has just
been notified by the Secretary of Ag-
riculture that a plan for the forecast-
ing of hot winds conducive to forest
fires, formulated jointly by the as-
sociation, the Forest Service and the
Portland office of the Weather Bur-
eau, has been approved and that
weather officials are being instructed
to co-operate in perfecting a system
for reports and forecasts to be issued
from Portland to San Francisco.

Most of the disastrous fires on this
coast occur when a high-pressure area
in Northern British Columbia and Al-
berta co-incides with a low-pressure
area in the California region, produc-
ing a violent southerly air current
which may however be sharply de-
flected in different directions by local
conditions, exceedingly drying be-
cause containing no moisture, and
well known as the summer "east
wind," "west wind" or "norther," ac-
cording to locality. In winter it is
the famous "Chinook." It is the
chief dread of fire fighters, for fires
not thoroughly in hand are likely to
be fanned beyond human control with
tremendous rapidity.

Reports upon the fire situation at
the close of July are that there have
been no serious fires in the Pacific
Northwest so far, but that the many
small ones show the season to have
commenced and all protective agen-
cies are recruiting forces to the max-
imum in the belief that safety due to
the wet spring is over. Undergrowth
fostered by two wet growing seasons
offers the greater hazard when it be-
comes dry and in many regions it
has been impossible to remove slash-
ings and like fire-traps by purposeful
burning.

TEN DOLLAR HOG PRICE REACHED

**RECORD OF THREE YEARS AGO
IS EQUALLED. CATTLE MAR-
KET WAS VERY BUSY ALL OF
LAST WEEK**

PORTLAND, July 28—Last week's
cattle market was one of the most
active ones of the year. Monday had
one of the largest single day runs,
containing considerable good quality
of beef. Prime steer top in steady to
strong at \$8 to \$8.25; cows and half-
cows \$7 at \$7.25 with occasional sales
15c to 20c higher. Outlet is broad
and buyers keen for prime stuff.

The hog market run wild for six
days, jumping in price from 9.35 to
10.00. Receipts have been unusually
light and the trade has been unable
to fill orders for pork supply.

The 10.00 price equals that of 1919
which was the highest hog market in
the history of the Union Stock Yards.
Liquidation will probably be tight for
the next few weeks, or until the an-
nual fall run of pigs commences.

Bulk of sales averaged 9.50 to 9.60.
Smooth heavy swine are steady to
strong.

The local mutton market has been
slow and unsteady. Very light de-
mand for either sheep or lambs and
receipts have been comparatively
small, mostly valley stuff.

Top quotations on valley lambs
5.25 to 5.50. Best Mt. Adams stock
worth 5.50 to 6.00. New tops at 3.75
and yearlings at 4.25 are extreme
prices.
