DEVELOPEMENT LEAGUE MEETING DATE WILL NOT BE CHANGED TO COVER TRIP OF SECRETARY LANE

COMMITTEE IS NAMED TO GET FARM EXHIBITS FROM KLAMATH COUNTY

In Addition to Agricultural Products on Display, There Will Also Be a Collection of the Native Birds and Animals—Tule Land Products Will Form Part of Display—Color for Convention to Be Chosen

The convention of the Central Oregon Development League will be held in Klamath Falls August 19, 20 and 21, as originally planned.

This was decided at last night's meeting of the directors of the Klamath Chamber of Commerce, when the question of postponing the meeting date a few days to cover the period of the visit of Secretary of the Interior Lane was discussed.

It was held that it was still uncertain as to what days Lane would be here, as he might decide to spend more time on the Umatilla project than he figures. The entertainment of Lane will be taken up separately after the Development League convention.

H. B. Hall, Wesley O. Smith and Sam Evans were named as an advertising committee for the Development League convention.

NEW YORK, July 26.—Evelyn Thaw, who has been appearing in London and Paris music halls, arrived this afternoon. She will soon appear at a local show house.

When told that she was billed here as "Evelyn Thaw," she became indignant.

"A part of my contract is to the effect that the name 'Thaw' will not appear in either the billing or the program," she said. "They must take that name off, or I will not appear."

COMING YEAR TO SEE A CHANGE

NINETEEN-FOURTEEN WILL SEE ENGLISH SUFFERS GET VOTE—MANY DISASTERS, PREDICTS "OLD MOORE"

LONDON, July 26.—The year 1914

is to be a great year for British suffragettes, the majority of whom will get the vote next spring, according to "Old Moore," England's only licensed prophet. The famous "Almanack" which comes out today has, however, little comfort for other folk, for the prophet gloomily predicts disasters galore—moving picture fires, the burning of a government building, mining explosions, earthquakes, volcanic eruptions, railway wrecks, bank failures and other equally distressing events.

England is to have a nation-wide strike, according to "Old Moore," a death in the royal family and an attempted assassination of a cabinet minister. Turkey is to be sponged off the map of Europe altogether. China will have another bloody rebellion, and there is a big massacre due in Asia Minor, while war between Germany and France will be only narrowly averted. Lovers may take comfort from the prediction that September 8 to 12 will be particularly favorable to affairs of the heart. All proposals made on those days will be accepted, and the marriages effected on them be of the happiest.

MINERS FIGHT; NINE INJURED

GOVERNOR OF MICHIGAN IS ENDEAVORING TO ARRANGE PEACE CONFERENCE—UNION-INT MILITIA MEN JAILED

CALUMET, July 26.—In a fight between the strikers and strikebreakers last night, nine were injured. Six men were arrested.

Two union men who belong to the militia are in jail for refusing to do patrol duty against the strikers.

The governor has telegraphed the leaders of both factions, proposing a conference at Lansing. He asks each side to name five men.

COUNTY-WIDE CLEAN-UP WILL BE MADE SOON

FIRST OFFENDER REPORTED IN FINED

County Health Officer Merryman Issues a Warning, Not Only to Residents of Klamath Falls, But in the Whole County—Refuse Must Be Burned—Where Thrown Out Parties Are Liable to Arrest

Do not throw refuse matter near any residence, or be subject to arrest and fine.

This is the edict handed down by County Health Officer George H. Merryman. To assist him he has called on all the constables and justices of the peace in Klamath county.

Already one arrest has been made for violation of this law.

This was August Brown, who was taken into custody Tuesday, following a complaint from A. A. Switzer, Switzer, who resides near the old county poor farm, made complaint to Merryman that Brown had dumped a pile of decayed vegetables near the Switzer residence.

Upon making an investigation, Merryman ordered Brown's arrest. He was brought before Justice of the Peace E. W. Gowen and fined \$50.

According to Merryman, the practice of dumping refuse of this character in the vicinity of residents must be stopped at once. He intends to have a rigid watch kept both in this city and in the county, and all offenders will be arrested and fined.

Decayed vegetables and rubbish of that character, in addition to becoming obnoxious to olfactory nerves, is also a favorite breeding place for disease germs. Cremation is the best method of getting rid of this offal.

HOTTEST DAY KILLING PEOPLE

ROCKIES TO THE ATLANTIC IS BLISTERING IN THE GLARE OF THE SUN—MANY FATALITIES REPORTED

United Press Service CHICAGO, July 26.—The country between the Rocky Mountains and the Atlantic Ocean is today experiencing the hottest day of the season. The maximum today was 98 degrees.

The sun is withering the crops, and there are no breezes. There were eighteen deaths and hundreds of prostrations reported today. Yesterday thirteen deaths were reported.

WALKER TRIAL STARTS TODAY

JURY IS SELECTED AND YORDY'S MOTIONS CONSIDERED TODAY—BORN'S TAKEN OVER LAW POINT RAINED

Taking of testimony in the trial of Charles Walker, a Bonanza Valley rancher, on a statutory charge, was commenced this afternoon. Otto Coburn, the 14-year-old girl who accuses her brother-in-law, was the first witness called.

During the girl's testimony a legal question regarding the admissibility of certain evidence was raised. An adjournment was taken for the looking up of authorities on the point.

Diggs and Caminetti Plead Not Guilty; Trial Tuesday

Trial of Diggs and Attorney Harris on Charge of Subornation of Perjury Will be Taken Up in Federal Court as Soon as White Slavery Cases Finished

United Press Service SAN FRANCISCO, July 26.—Drew Caminetti and Maury F. Diggs today entered pleas of not guilty to charges of violating the Mann white slavery act. They appeared before Federal District Judge Van Fleet.

The trial of Diggs commences Tuesday morning. Caminetti will be tried as soon as the Diggs trial is finished.

It is expected that each case will occupy three or four days.

Diggs and Attorney Harris, counsel for Diggs and Caminetti, were also arraigned on charge of subornation

of perjury in connection with testimony introduced at the former trial.

Both pleaded not guilty. Their trials on this charge will come immediately after the white slavery charges are disposed of.

Caminetti is the son of Immigration Commissioner Caminetti, and he and Diggs are prominent in California social circles. Both men are married.

They are charged with illegally transporting girls out of the state for immoral purposes. With two Sacramento girls, the two men were living in Nevada when they were arrested

this spring. On account of the prominence of the persons implicated, the case attracted widespread attention.

Further publicity was given it by former United States District Attorney John L. McNab, who charged Attorney General McKeen with trying to block the prosecution for political reasons by ordering the cases postponed.

McNab alleged that pressure was being brought to bear in the case by the department of labor, with which Commissioner Caminetti is connected. As a result, McNab resigned his position.

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
