ARMY OF WOMEN TAKES CAPITAL FOR SUFFRAGE

THOUSANDS ARE WORKING FOR
THE CAUSE

Big Delegation of Men is a Feature of
Monster Procession—Senators and
Congressmen Are Recipients of
Personal Appeals From Fair Work-
ers for the Ballot—Wives of Prom-
inent Officials Prominent

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 31.—
An army of peace invaded Washing-
ton today and laid siege to the na-
tion's legislature. The object of the
"attacking force" was complete suf-
frage for women to be granted by
constitutional amendment. The demon-
stration was the greatest display of
suffrage strength the Capital City has
yet seen. Before the day was over
at least two fair invaders had "en-
gaged" each representative and sen-
ator in a personal appeal for the im-
mediate consideration and passage
of a constitutional amendment which
will place women on political equal-
ity with men throughout the United
States.

Delegations representing every
state in the Union were in the line of
march. The paraders were foot, on
horseback, in carriages and on floats
in classic costumes. When the parade
began there was every indication that
the Washington police department
would not repeat the mistake it made
on March 3, last, when insufficient
patrolling of the streets permitted
hoodlums to break up the parade by
swarming into the floats and car-
riages in which young and elderly
women alike were trampled and in
some cases subjected to insult.

The paraders made the pilgrimage
to Washington by automobile, by
boat and by train. Along the way
they gathered thousands of signa-
tures to a petition urging congress to
immediate favorable action on the
proposed measure to give women the
vote. On floats representing the vari-
ous states the women and girls were
costumed to represent the figures in
the seals of their respective states.

Early this morning the suffrage
forces were mobilized at the little
Maryland town of Hyattsville, eight
miles from the Capitol building.

Mayor Harry Shephard delivered an
address of welcome when the pil-
grims reached the town park where
a grand review was conducted by Miss
Alice Paul and Miss Lucy Burns of
the national congressional committee.
The suffrage colors were run to the
top of a tall flagstaff the moment the
first delegation, travel-worn, stepped
into the reviewing grounds. An or-
derly crowd of several thousand wit-
nessed these preliminaries.

Among the paraders were Miss
Jeannette Rankin, president of the
Montana suffrage organization, with
a party which came all the way by
automobile; Miss Harriet May Mills,
president of the New York Associa-
tion, who has just completed a tour
of the Empire State in a caravan
built in 1776; Mrs. Susan Walker
Pittenger, of the Massachusetts Pol-
itical Equality Union, who recently
led a campaign of the New England
states; and Mrs. Frank M. Roosevelt,
president of the Pennsylvania suf-
fragists.

A delegation of men of unusual
numbers was led by R. C. Beadle, the
president of the New York Men's
League, whose party had presented

LEAD MINERS AFTER A RAISE

UNLESS THEIR DEMAND IS MET
TOMORROW, QUESTION OF A
GENERAL STRIKE WILL BE
PUT TO THE UNIONISTS

PLATTE RIVER, Mo., July 31.—
Unless the lead mine owners formally
announce by tomorrow that they will
grant the increases in wages demand-
ed by the miners, the question of a
strike will be put to a referendum
vote.

The miners some time ago gave the
owners until August 1 to grant them
a straight increase of 50 cents per
day, recognition of their union and
adoption by the company of the check
off system whereby the companies de-
duct union dues from the pay of the
union members and turn it over to the
union officials.

The miners contend that they are
the poorest paid of any mineral work-
ers in the country, and say that even
if the demands are granted the aver-
age salary will be only \$2.50 per day
in comparison to the \$3.50 daily wage
paid in the Butte district.
