BULGARIA TAKES OFFENSIVE SIDE

REPORT THAT RUSSIAN OFFICERS ARE MAKING SOUNDINGS IN THE BLACK SEA CAUSE MUCH SPECULATION

LONDON, July 31.—Semi-official dispatches received from Sofia are to the effect that the Bulgarians have taken the offensive on the Upper Danubian River.

They have succeeded in capturing the Greek and Serbian forces. The Serbs have been routed, say the reports.

The Greeks have just failed in several engagements.

Dispatches from Constantinople state that the British fleet is making movements in the Black Sea. The Porte, it is believed, is planning a naval demonstration.

SALONIKA, July 31.—The French commandant named to investigate the reported abduction by the Bulgarians, returned today from Doina, confirming the stories of the massacres. They estimated a number of shocking photographs.

SHOWERS HELP PARCHED EAST

THUNDERSTORMS PREDICTED FOR TONIGHT—STOCK EXCHANGE PREDICTS A GREAT SHORTAGE IN CROPS

CHICAGO, July 31.—Showers late last night relieved the heat to a great extent. The thermometer dropped from 94 to 83 this morning, but the humidity is great.

Lower temperatures are predicted in most of the Middle Western cities, and thunderstorms, it is thought, will break the heat tonight.

The light showers of last night and this morning brought no improvement in the crops in Illinois, Nebraska and Iowa.

Widespread buying in the pit has caused a jump of 2 cents in corn prices. Traders predict a great shortage.
