TAXICAB RATES ARE LOWER NOW

REDUCTION IN FARES TO BE CHARGED PATRONS OF NEW YORK'S TAXI CABS GOES INTO EFFECT TODAY

Called From Service
NEW YORK, Aug. 1.—Beginning today you can hop into a taxi in New York city, ride a considerable distance without having to give the chauffeur your watch, rings and a mortgage on the old homestead for payment. Sweeping reductions in the rates are included in the new law, which went into effect today.

One part of the new regulations prohibits the use of "unfit hacks and irresponsible drivers." An entirely new system of registering for licenses by prospective chauffeurs and drivers becomes effective.

By the new system the taxi patron may feel assured that he is not being "cheated" by a thug, raggaman, pickpocket or escaped convict—which he couldn't be certain of before today.

All taximeters will be inspected regularly, in some instances daily, and the chauffeur who "runs up" his taximeter on a customer is liable to a heavy fine or jail sentence, or both.

Because of the frequency with which dishonest chauffeurs formerly got patrons, inebriated and other wise, to ride on the front seat with them under various pretexts, and then rob them, both the passengers and chauffeur are liable to fine if the former rides outside with the driver.

But the order of "Honey" Fitzgerald, mayor of Boston town, the public was given Punch and Judy shows instead of grand opera.

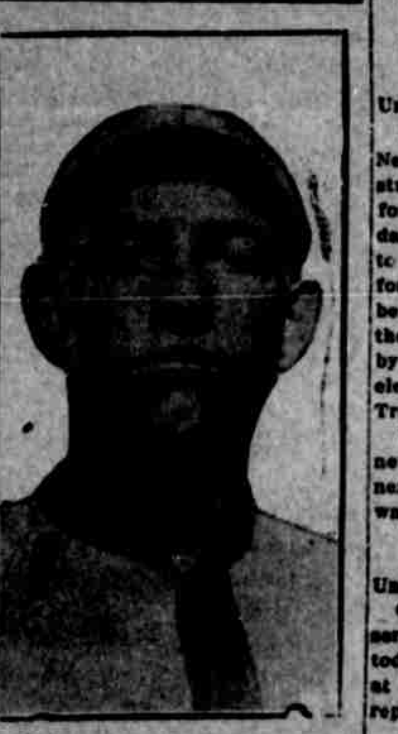
The common, in the opinion of Mayor Fitzgerald, won't hold the spectators.

Joe Boehling, New Southpaw Wonder



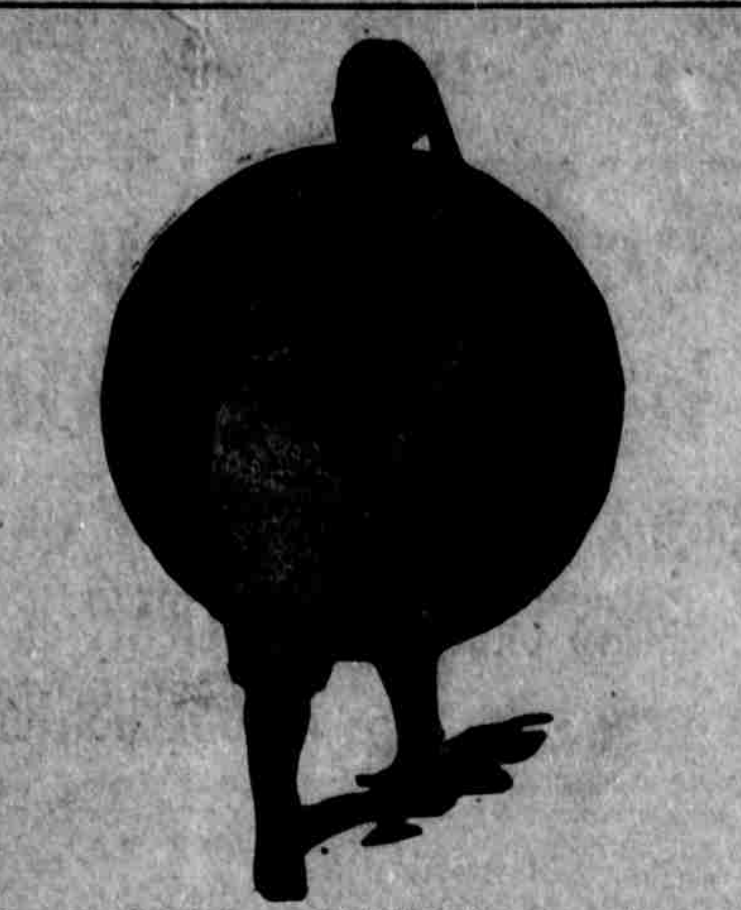
Joe Boehling, the new southpaw wonder of the Senators of Washington, had won eleven straight games up to Thursday, July 30, thereby breaking the pitching record of the two big leagues for this season, and incidentally showing that Clark Griffith, the manager of the team, came near making one of the mistakes of his career. Griffith announced some weeks ago that there were no more good southpaws, and all the time he had one of the best in his possession.

He got Boehling two years ago and then let him go—with strings on—to the New England League. Hoping the young man might develop, he got him back this season, but kept him on the bench. Finally Griffith was induced to give the boy a chance, and he made good. He even equalled the season's record of the wonderful Walter Johnson, who is doubtless the best pitcher in baseball. Had Griffith started to pitch the young man some weeks ahead of the time he did start, the club might now be higher in the percentage table, and might be considered a contender for the pennant in the league.
