Pursuant to a resolution passed and adopted by the Common Council of the city of Klamath Falls, Oregon, on the 16th day of July, 1913, notice is hereby given that bids will be received by the Police Judge of said city up to and including the 4th day of August, 1913, at the hour of 8 o'clock p. m. for the improvement of TENTH street from its intersection with Main street north, including all street intersections, to Prospect street, by grading to the established grade, and by paving the same to the width of 40 feet from Main street to Pine street; and by paving the same to the width of 30 feet from Pine street to Prospect street, with macadam; and the putting in of curbs and storm sewer system and gutters; and in such work of improvement a space or strip of ten feet wide on each side of the said Tenth street shall be prepared for parking and sidewalk construction. All of said improvement and work shall be done and materials used in accordance with the plans and specifications made by the city engineer and on file in the office of the Police Judge of said city, a reference thereto is hereby made for greater detail regarding work and materials. The improvement is to be fully completed by November 1st, 1913, and the contractor will be required to give a bond in the sum of \$7,000.00 conditioned for the faithful performance of the work to the satisfaction of the Common Council and the city engineer. Said improvement will be let in one contract. Bids for making said improvement will be opened and considered by the Common Council on the evening of August 4th, 1913, at the hour of 8 o'clock p. m. at the office of the Police Judge in said city.

Each bid must be accompanied by a certified check on some responsible bank for five per cent of the aggregate bid, as a guarantee that the bidder, if successful, will enter into contract with the city for the making of the improvement. BRYAN ASKS FOR BIG RELIEF FUND

STATE SECRETARY WANTS \$100,000 FOR DISTRESSED AMERICAN FAMILIES MARCOONED IN MEXICO AND IN WANT

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 1.—Secretary of State William Jennings Bryan today requested an emergency appropriation of \$100,000 to be expended in the relief of Americans in Mexico, who have been rendered destitute by the guerilla tactics of both fighting factions.

This fund will be used to transport them home.

The request was rushed to Speaker Champ Clark by Secretary McAdoo of the treasury department.

AMBASSADOR TO RETURN SOUTH

AFTER INVITATION FOR APPEARANCE BEFORE SENATE COMMITTEE IN MEXICO, IT IS RECALLED

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 1.—Mexican Ambassador Henry Lane Wilson is preparing to return to Mexico immediately. He so telegraphed to Chairman Flood of the house foreign relations committee from New York.

This morning the ambassador was invited to appear before the house foreign relations committee tomorrow morning. The invitation was recalled an hour later.

The revocation was made at the request of President Wilson. He said that he did not desire the ambassador to further air his views regarding the Mexican situation.

Blue Sky Law Effective

COLUMBUS, Ohio, Aug. 1.—Ohio's new blue sky laws became operative today. By the new laws all who deal in securities are required to take out a state license with certain exceptions. The laws exempt stocks, securities of manufacturing and transportation companies, common carriers and public utilities issued and outstanding prior to February 1, 1913.
