WANT LOGGING IN THE COLLEGES

PACIFIC LOGGING ASSOCIATION BELIEVES THIS IMPORTANT WORK SHOULD RECEIVE MORE ATTENTION

SPOKANE, Wash., Aug. 7.—Believing that the logging industry has grown to such an extent that the most scientific methods must be employed in removing logs from the woods with the least possible delay and breakage, it was announced today that the Pacific Logging Association, which will meet here September 24th, will endeavor to have established chairs of logging engineering in all the Western and large Eastern colleges and universities. Several hundred loggers will attend the convention next month.

NEW DEVICE TO RESCUE MINERS

TELEPHONE TO BE DISTRIBUTED AMONG GROUPS OF WORKERS MEN WORKING IN ISOLATED PLACES

PITTSBURG, Pa., Aug. 7.—Mine operators of this vicinity today are planning to try out a device recently perfected here at the United States bureau of mines, by which it is believed miners caught in caves might be saved.

The device is a portable telephone with a headgear greatly resembling that worn by telephone operators. It is planned to have at least one miner in every group of workers or in every isolated section of a mine wear one of these gears, to which is attached a transmitter and super-sensitive plate, and a wire which reaches the outside, thus leaving a medium for conversation with persons outside the mine. The wire is always laid along the bottom of a shaft or bore, protected so that falling earth or mineral will not break it.

WILL OPEN MORE LAND FOR ENTRY

HIS TRACT IN UNION COUNTY TO BE EXAMINED BY SOIL EXPERTS—LARGER PORTION ALREADY APPLIED FOR

Twenty-one thousand acres of land lying about ten miles north of Palmer Junction, in Union county, Eastern Oregon, will be classified during the summer by the department of agriculture. The bureau of soils will also cover the land, and all that is found suitable for agricultural purposes will be thrown open for settlement and entry under the homestead law.

Practically all of this land has already been applied for. The sections which are not adapted to agriculture will not be opened, and many of the applicants will be disappointed by inability to secure the full number of acres asked for.

Very few tracts will be available for those who have not already filed their applications.
