SIXTEEN FOUNDER CAUGHT IN WILLIAMSON IS MOTIF FOR A FISH STORY IN SA FRANCISCO PRINT

The following is from the San Francisco Bulletin:
The pilgrimage of local anglers to the Klamath Lake and Williamson River fishing resorts annually is, from the sportsman viewpoint, gradually taking on the coloring of a perfunctory duty. For an extended trout-fishing outing that region is a magnet of most enthusiastic attraction.

James M. Oliver of this city, with Mrs. Oliver and two children, returned last week from a three-weeks' stay at Eagle Ridge, Upper Klamath Lake. His report of the fine fishing to be enjoyed will no doubt be received by intending visitors, and they are many, with a keen relish that can only be satisfied when the fly or spoon is put into commission.
Fly fishing in Williamson River and Crystal Creek is now at its best, and a fisherman of only ordinary ability can land a limit readily. The trout accept either the "tip-top" or Wilson trolling spoons. The royal coachman and gray hackle flies are the best killing patterns.

The prize catch was a huge 16-pound lake trout, 34 inches in length and 19 inches in girth. The big fish put up a twenty minute fight before it was gaffed and was landed with a six ounce casting rod and a No. 4 Wilson spoon on a wire leader. The capture was made at the mouth of the Williamson, where it empties into the lake, a favorite spot for large trout.
In Short Creek, two miles from Pelican Bay, Mrs. Oliver had the good luck and pleasure of landing a trout that scaled 11 pounds. The daily catch of fish was never less than ten pounds.

Recent reports from the upper reaches of the Williamson and its tributary, Spring Creek, state that the trout are hungry for the fly lure. The latter water is a famous stretch for the dry-fly enthusiast to practice his art. Klamath Falls, Ore., is the point of departure for either Eagle Ridge, Pelican Bay, or Sillies, by launch to the lake or by stage to the fishing places.

Personal Purity Classes Are to be Conducted in Chicago's High Schools This Year. No Text Books

CHICAGO, Aug. 8.—With the opening of the fall term of the Chicago public schools but a few weeks distant, Superintendent Ella Flagg Young admitted today that she has made no definite selections of the men and women who are to conduct classes in the new "personal purity" course to be launched in the Chicago high schools. She will call a conference of high school principals within a week to hear suggestions.
"We feel that we have taken a radical, almost a revolutionary step in adopting the personal purity course in Chicago," said Mrs. Young. "We realize that other cities will closely watch the working out of the venture and will take it up if Chicago is successful. We who have advocated this course feel certain of success, which will mean that in another generation false and prudish standards will be swept away with the proper training of children. We will be careful in mapping out our course and in choosing our instructors, for we want to be certain of our ground before we go ahead."
Applications for positions as instructors have come to the office of Mrs. Young from scores of physicians, men and women. While the teachers will be recruited largely from members of the medical profession, Mrs. Young declared today that careful personal investigation is being made to determine the physicians who are most competent to discuss sex questions before high school pupils.
"Many physicians and scientific men," she said, "have their sense of delicacy blunted by the very nature of their work. Their psychology is too far removed from that of the child. Their minds move in a different sphere, and their fitness will be determined not alone on their standing as physicians, but also on their understanding and tact in handling delicate subjects so that we can avoid at the start any shock to the young boys and girls. We must have instructors who can meet the pupils' minds properly."
"Of course there will be segregation. Boys will be taught by male instructors and girls will have women instructors. The classes will be divided into small groups—small enough for the instructors to obtain the personal, confidential effect."
"There will be no text books—no printed matter that might be subject to wrongful interpretation, or any interpretation at all by the pupils who are at a formative age. Instruction will be solely by lectures. But we will expect pupils to ask questions in class groups. If the course is successful in the high schools, we may institute a course at for the grade schools. At first we shall present only a limited view of the course. Within a few weeks we hope that the boys and girls will come to accept the in-

RUSSIANS COME TO THIS NATION

THE TIDE OF EMIGRATION HAS REACHED BIG FIGURE, SAY MUSCOVITE OFFICIALS—MONT OF THEM TO STAY

ST. PETERSBURG, Aug. 8.—The tide of emigration from Russia to the United States and South America has reached unprecedented proportions, according to government figures given out officially here today.
The figures were taken from the reports of provincial governors to the ministry of the interior. The emigrants at present come chiefly from the provinces of Volhynia, Kiev, Kharkov, Minsk and Saratov.
Six thousand are arriving daily at Libau for the purpose of embarking on steamers leaving that port for the Americas.
It is noted in the report published today that Russians who emigrate to the Americas rarely return to their mother country, as do those from Italy and some of the countries of Southern and Central Europe.
