To Keep Water Company
The Bandon city council has in-
structed the city attorney to institute
proceedings in the fall term of the
circuit court to annul the franchise
of the Bandon Water company, and
to make the necessary legal arrange-
ments for the installation of a munici-
pal water system for this city. Dis-
satisfaction with the present system
of private ownership and the poor
water supply led to the demand for a
municipal plant. At the city election
in June the voters turned down the
proposition that the city buy the
present system for the sum of \$60,-
000 on the ground that the price was
exorbitant.

The Peniston Granite company
has received from H. M. Parks, direc-
tor of the staff of the Oregon bureau
of mines and geology, with headquar-
ters at Corvallis, stating that he wish-
es to visit their quarries and examine
the building stone, with a view to its

quarry men assist him in getting suit-
able samples of stone and in the ex-

Two American League Managers Who Have Been "Stung" in Deals

Frank Chance, manager of the New
York Americans, believes he was
"stung" by Jimmy Callahan, man-
ager of the Chicago White Sox, when
he made the most notable baseball
trade of the year by giving Hal Chase
the greatest first baseman known to
the game, for Felder, third baseman,
and Borton, the new first baseman.
Borton has turned out to be of no
use to the New York club, and he was
sold to a minor league club. Felder
developed a bunion shortly after he
reached New York, and he has been
out of the game for three weeks. To-
day the net result of the deal to the
New York club has been the loss of
Chance.

But Callahan has another story.
"I had no reason to believe that

Borton would fall down on his but-
tong," said he. "We made the deal
to help Chance in New York, and I
am sorry Borton had proved useless.
As to Felder, I didn't know anything
was the matter with him at the time
of the trade. He told me nothing
about it, and I believed I was giving
