TO TRY EUROPEAN METHODS HERE

has given out the following letter addressed to the governors of the states the farmers organizations, agricultural institutions and the farmers of America.

"The American Commission on Agricultural Co-Operation has completed its tour of European countries, and has perfected plans to digest and compile the information obtained with regard to co-operation and the organization of rural life in European countries along financial, business and social lines. It is believed that this task can be completed before the end of the present year, when the final report of the commission will be submitted.

"The commission is deeply impressed with the vital importance of a thoroughly organized and united rural population. In this respect the countries of Europe offer a lesson which may not long be disregarded in America without serious consequences.

"The agricultural interests of most of the European countries visited by the commission are organized along one or more of the following lines: Credit, production, distribution and social organization for the betterment of country life.

"Organizations for the provision of credit facilities for European farmers follow the natural division into short time personal credit and long time land mortgage credit. The organizations for the provision of personal credit facilities are as highly developed as are the systems of commercial banking. The prevailing rate of interest paid by the farmers for short time loans is from four to five and a half per cent. The terms offered European farmers are generally better designed to meet the peculiar requirements of agriculturists than are the terms obtainable today by the American farmers.

WATER USERS ARE SLOW VOTING

said board introduced and passed a resolution asking "that the honorable secretary of the interior permit this Association to undertake the maintenance and operation of the first unit of the Klamath project under such form of contract and agreement as shall to the secretary of the interior appear to be essential for the mutual protection of the stockholders of this association and the reclamation fund under the reclamation act."

I acknowledge receipt of a circular letter under date of July 11, 1913, and over the signature of W. W. Patch, project engineer, asking that a vote be returned to the local office of the United States reclamation service, Klamath Falls, Oregon.

In said circular letter there was a lengthy list of provisions which the said service evidently proposes to require as a condition precedent to turning over the project to the Water Users Association for management. Of the advisability or legal significance of these many requirements I am not advised, and by resolution heretofore adopted the matter of arrangements, terms, etc., upon which the management could be turned over to the Water Users Association was left to the board of directors. The terms as set forth in the said circular letter appear to be the labor of the reclamation officials solely, and our board has had no part in any negotiations as we have authorized them so to do.

I am in favor of the management of the operation and maintenance of the first unit of the Klamath project by the Water Users Association, provided terms can be agreed upon which will insure justice to both ourselves and the reclamation fund. I am not, however, in favor of any attempt on the part of the reclamation to place the water user in a position where he cannot vote for a proposition which he believes is for his own interest and the good of the project, as is evidently the intention of the said circular letter. Whenever the board of directors submits to me the terms of a contract of agreement fully considered by both the board of directors and the reclamation service, and agreed upon by both as fair to both parties, I will then place myself upon record in the matter of future management of the first unit of the Klamath Project.

The conditions, as outlined by the reclamation service in its letter accompanying the ballot are as follows: "If the association is to assume the duty of operation and maintenance of the first unit of the Klamath project it must enter into a formal contract with the secretary of the interior covering the following requirements: (a)—The association shall complete a proper field organization prior to the next irrigation season, on or before a date to be fixed by the reclamation service. (b)—The irrigation manager em-

ployed by the association shall be a man of recognized experience and ability in operating and maintaining an irrigation system.

(c)—All employees shall be directly engaged and paid by the association.

(d)—All works shall be maintained in good order and satisfactory to the reclamation service.

(e)—Water shall be distributed according to a schedule prepared by the association and approved by the reclamation service.

(f)—Proper records and water measurements shall be kept up according to a schedule prepared by the reclamation service.

(g)—Drainage work shall be continued by the association according to a schedule approved by the reclamation service.

(h)—Any machinery, tools or equipment of the United States that the association may take over shall be paid for at the time of transfer.

(i)—In case of failure by the association to properly maintain or operate the system, the reclamation service reserves the right to intervene

immediately either by cancelling the contract or by performing necessary work and charging cost of same to the association.

(j)—All installments due the United States on account of building the first unit shall be paid to the United States by the association on or before a fixed date annually, whether collected or not.

(k)—The association shall pay to the United States each year such sum as shall be fixed from time to time by the reclamation service as necessary to cover the expense to the United States of maintaining and operating the headworks of the main canal, and such overhead charges as the director shall decide as properly chargeable to the first unit of this project.

(l)—The association shall furnish surety bonds satisfactory to the United States, in such sum as the United States shall determine is necessary to cover all liability for fire and water damage, salaries of employees, payments of building and other charges, and the proper upkeep of the system.

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
