After Another Market

T. E. Giller, commercial agent of
the Nevada-California-Oregon rail-
way was in Lakeview last week from
his headquarters at Reno. He was
looking over the territory adjacent to
the line soliciting tonnage for out-
shipments. The N.C.O. is making
special effort to induce local farmers
to ship their produce to outside mar-
kets, and Mr. Giller stated that as
soon as this business was started his
road would establish joint rates with
the Southern Pacific and Western Pa-
cific lines to justify the transportation
of tonnage from this section.—Lake-
view Herald.

Big Valley Matter Up

There has been a great deal said
and written regarding this matter
(Big Valley reservoir), and it is a
known fact that Congressman Baker
has used his untiring efforts to have
this land released. The department
has absolutely refused to give any en-
couragement in this matter, but ac-
cording upon the suggestion of Congress-
man Baker it has agreed to make a
re-survey, and if it is possible to
greatly reduce the boundary lines of
the reservoir. The department pro-
poses to use \$40,000 in this regard,
providing the state of California will
appropriate a like amount, for the
purpose of the re-survey.—Alturas
New Era.

Big Timber Sale

The secretary of agriculture has
just notified District Forester Dufols
of the approval of the sale of 3,000-
900,000 feet of national forest timber
from the Klamath national forest in
Siskiyou county. The area involved
lies north of the Klamath River be-
tween Hornbrook and Happy Camp.
The sale of this timber depends upon
the construction of seventy-two miles
of railroad to tap the main line of the
Southern Pacific at Hornbrook, and
the timber will not be sold until
transportation is assured.—Yreka
Journal.

Restocking Stream

During the past week Game Warden
H. P. McKinnis has been busy
transporting the fingerling trout from
the hatchery at the A. L. Thorsten
place to the different streams in the
surrounding country. The game warden
sent 5,000 to Crooked Creek by
Dr. E. H. Smith, 10,000 to Cotton-
wood by Morris Southstone, 1,000 to
Crane Creek by Jack Flynn and 2,000
to be placed in the Chewaucan by
Stanley Gray. There are still about
75,000 of these baby trout to be dis-
tributed.—Lakeview Herald.

Old Timer Gets the Axe

One of the largest and oldest oak
trees in Polk county has been cut
down on the Whiteaker farm, 2 1/2
miles north of Monmouth. It was
found by counting the rings in a cross
section that the big oak was 336
years old, which makes its birth date
1587. The tree measured 18 feet in
circumference.

Brilliant New Tennis Player Who May Become A Champion



W. M. Johnson, the California won-
der at tennis, 18 years old, is the
coming man, according to experts in
the game. He is in some respects
much like McLaughlin, the American
champion, who has just helped lift
the Davis Cup in hard fought con-
tests in England.

Johnson, who has red hair like Mc-

Loughlin, has great speed and daring.
He has a fast straight service. His
kill is not as deadly as that of the
champion, but his back court game is
perhaps the best in the country. He
has a great forehand drive, with a re-
markable control of the ball. He has
lift and "top" and drives the ball fast-
er and straighter than McLaughlin.

The Electricians blew out a couple
of fuses Sunday at Modoc Park, and
allowed the Real Estate men to close
a contract on the ball game, the
terms being 14 to 3, and a commis-
sion for the umpire. French, who
handled the indicator till the damage
was done, was unfortunate in his de-
cision. His intentions were evidently
on the best, but the breaks all went
against the Electricians.

Hura grabbed off the batting hon-
ors, getting two singles and a pair of
doubles out of four attempts. He also
displayed quite some class around the
initial bag, figuring in the only dou-
ble play of the game.

Cole Oliver received a generous
round of applause when he snared a
high fly in the right meadow. Hoyt
was also given a round of cheers
when he picked a high one out of the
atmosphere. "Kid" Smith came near
being put out of the game on several
occasions on account of his contin-
ued scrapping with the umpire.

George singled in the first frame
and took second when Sloe walked
Motchenbacher; Krause also drew
free transportation, filling the bag;
Capron hit infield, scoring George;
Elliot lifted one over the third seat
for a safe single, allowing Motchen-
bacher to walk home, but Capron,
trying for the plate on the same hit,
was out, Sloe to Stevens; Willey
laid down a bunt and went to first
while an ineffectual attempt was
made on the life of Krause at the
plate; Oliver sent one to Hura, who
doubled Willey. Three runs.

The Wire Stringers nearly over-
did it in their half of the same frame.
Sloe singled, and scored on a dandy
double by Hura; Stevens lifted one
over the right field fence, but the
ground rules would let him have only
two men on it, so he rested at sec-
ond. Hura was called out at third
on a close play on a throw from
Krause to George; Sloe sent one slip-
ping down first base line which
Capron handled prettily to Motchen-
bacher, who had covered first; Fringe
was out on three batters. Two
runs.

In the second spasm the Real Es-
tate men added another run on an
error at third, a stolen base and a
pooled ball. In the third they an-
nounced four more. Krause was safe on
Fringe's error; Capron went to first
on a fielder's choice; Elliot was out
by the Hoyt-Hura combination; Wil-
ley lammed out a two-batter, scoring
Krause and Capron; Oliver walked
and stole second, went to third on
"Kid" Smith's out, while Willey was
scoring, and tallied when Fringe let
a grounder from French get past

him; George was out, Stevens to
Hura. Four runs.

The Real Estate men tallied twice
in the fourth and four times in the
sixth. In the seventh the Electricians
started a rally that netted four runs.
Sloe lived on an error by Elliot;
Hura poked out a double, his fourth
hit of the day; Stevens followed with
a two base drive that scored Sloe and
Hura; Sloe was out on three strikes;
Fringe singled through the infield;
Brenneman was sent in to bat for
Adams and justified the change by
lifting the ball into deep center for a
pair of bases, sending Stevens and
Fringe across the pen. Welly and
Sholt went out in order. Four runs.
