PROFIT IN HOG RAISING IS SHOWN

during the balance of the year, and each carload does as well. That would make ten carloads and a profit of \$8,333.20. As there are now more than 2,000 head of hogs on the ranches of the company, the shipments will probably continue the year round.

Compare these figures with the grain business. Suppose in place of feeding their 35,000 to 40,000 bushels of grain to hogs they had hauled it to Condon, the nearest railroad point. Or suppose the road were already built to Fossil, and they hauled the grain there, say an average haul from the ranch of fifteen miles. The wheat fed this last carload of hogs weighed 55,550 pounds; the fattened hogs weighed but 30,000 pounds.

The point is just this: Feed more of the grain to livestock. Our sheep-owners are in a terrible hurry about the tariff on wool. Let them try to forget it and build their business along new lines—better wool and better mutton and more of each. That means grain-fed sheep, and why not? We can produce as good mutton as is grown in the world, and we ought to double and treble our output and raise the quality until we control the markets of the West.

TURKS REFUSE TO QUIT CITY

Chicago Swimmer After New Record



Michael McDermott of the Illinois Athletic Club of Chicago, America's champion and record holder in breast stroke swimming, will attempt to create a new 200 yard standard at the water carnival to be held at Put-in-Bay, Ohio, on August 27, 28 and 29, in connection with the Perry Centennial celebrations, and confidence is felt that he will succeed in the undertaking.

The young Westerner has bettered the classic figures several times already in the past, and he is now moving faster than ever. It is a foregone conclusion that he will capture the Centennial championship title, at stake in the coming event, and if conditions are not unfavorable there is no doubt that he will lower the open water mark now obtaining.

McDermott, although but 20 years old, has been the peer of our breast stroke swimmers since 1910, and competed for this country at the Stockholm Olympics, defeating many of the leading European cracks. He is a stocky, powerful young athlete, standing 5 feet 4 1/2 inches, and weighing 160 pounds.

DIAZ PARTY IS AT VANCOUVER

MEXICAN POLITICIAN SAILS ON WEDNESDAY FOR JAPAN—HE REFUSES TO DISCUSS HIS MISSION AT ALL

United Press Service. SEATTLE, Aug. 11.—Felix Diaz and his party left this morning for Vancouver, B. C., where they will take steamer Wednesday for Japan.
