HOUSTON STOPS MANY BULLETINS

INSTEAD OF THE MULTIPLICITY
OF PAMPHLETS, AGRICULTURE
DEPARTMENT WILL PRINT A
GENERAL JOURNAL

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 12.—
A revolution, bloodless, to be sure, is
going on in the department of Agri-
culture under the guidance of the
new secretary, Mr. David H. Houston.

He is simplifying matters and work in
every direction, and one of the most
important steps he has taken thus far
is to do away with the confusion that
has resulted from the multiplicity of
the series of publications issued by
the department. It will not only be
interesting, but will be a relief to the
general public, and especially to the
farmers, big and little, to know that
the department will discontinue the
general distribution of matter so sci-
entific or technical as to be of prac-
tically no use to the lay reader. The
technical information will be supplied
only to those directly interested. This
information will be embodied in the
newly established "Journal of Re-
search," as it has been named, and
which will be published about once a
month. This publication will be dis-
tributed free to agricultural colleges,
technical schools, experiment sta-
tions, libraries of large universities
and to a restricted list of scientists.

"The Monthly Crop Reporter" will no
longer be published. These statistics
will continue to be collected, how-
ever, and disseminated through the
public press. However, as a partial
substitute for the "Reporter" a week-
ly news letter to crop correspondents
will be issued. It will contain sum-
maries of more important discov-
eries of departmental officers. The fa-
mous year book will be restricted to
articles of the magazine type, and the
series of farmers' bulletins will be
continued, telling the people how to
do important things.

The new plan of publication work
has been designed primarily to im-
prove the character of the depart-
ment's publications, and secondarily
to prevent waste in distribution. It
is believed by Secretary Houston and
his aids that through the economies
effected a greater output of infor-
mation will be made possible.

Johnson-Palmer at Marcellus

PARIS, Aug. 12.—Because Jack
Johnson has been making himself ob-
jectionable in the Paris cafes, revul-
sion of feeling has caused the man-
agers of the Palmer-Johnson fight to
stage it at Marcellus, instead of here,
as was formerly planned. Fight pro-
moters fear Johnson's reputation
would seriously hurt the game here,
since several Paris newspapers have
taken up the cudgel against Paris
opening its arms to the big black
who had to see the United States on
a white slavery charge.

the Earl of Rockavase. The British
nobility has held aloof from such

very rare, but the Earl of Rockavase
stands so high in noble society that
his bride will doubtless be re-
ceived.

She is the daughter of Sir Edward
Sassoon, who has been knighted. He
was a member of parliament from
Hythe. Her brother, Sir Philip Sas-
soon, succeeded his father as a mem-
ber of parliament from the same con-
stituency. Miss Sassoon is only 19
years old; the earl is 30. He is the
elder son of the Marquess of Chol-
mondeley. He served in the South
African war.
