STATE IRRIGATION BOARD PLANS  
A PERSONAL CAREY ACT PROJECT INSPECTION—HERE ON  
AUGUST 22

SALEM, Aug. 15.—The members of the state board are planning on going in a body personally to inspect the various state and Carey act irrigation projects in Oregon, winding up at Klamath Falls August 22, in time to meet Secretary of the Interior Lane, who is scheduled to attend a meeting of the Oregon Development League there.

The board members expect to leave Saturday. They will go first to the Tualum project, the state's first effort in exclusively handling an irrigation project, and from there to the Central Oregon project, the Morson project at La Pine and the Paisley project.

A trip of a similar nature was taken by the board about two years ago, and proved of great value to the members in handling project affairs thereafter.

PARIS, Aug. 15.—Figures showing depopulation in France, published today, are regarded as the most startling in years. In the department of Gers, the figures showed that for every 100 babies born, 143 people died; in Lot-et-Garonne the proportion is 100 to 131. In thirty departments the deaths outnumbered the births, while in only nine departments did the births come up to the average for the German empire.

**County and Progress of Nearby Communities as Chronicled in the Press.**

**To Vote on Bonds**  
The county court Friday afternoon in response to petitions received, issued a call for a special election to be held Tuesday, September 9. Submitting to the people the issuance of \$500,000 5 per cent bonds for the construction of a paved highway to the Josephine county line from the California state line, a distance of 53 miles, following the route of the present county road, and utilizing the paved streets of Ashland, Medford and Central Point, construction to be under supervision of the state highway engineer—Medford Mail-Tribune

**Perhaps a County Hospital**  
Believing that the time has arrived when the county should own its hospital, and thereby care for its patients at a less cost than under the present system, the members of the county court are today considering the advisability of purchasing five acres of land, now a part of the fair grounds, east of the city. The members of the court visited the fair grounds last evening, and after a brief inspection tentatively selected a five acre tract upon which they will erect and maintain a modern hospital in the event they decide to make the purchase.—Roseburg News.

**She Also Falls**  
Dr. Bestel, a Grants Pass veterinarian, reports a case that is of more than passing interest. Six weeks ago he was called upon to prescribe for an ailing cow belonging to the Englewood dairy. The sick bovine did not respond to treatment, and Monday he ordered it killed to put it out of its misery. A post-mortem examination made by the doctor disclosed that the cow had swallowed a 12-penny wire nail, and that the nail had penetrated through the walls of the stomach and the diaphragm and into the heart.

**Bees Not Began**  
The young orchards of Alturas have been discovered to be infested with aphids and other fruit parasites. Even the vines are covered, and some of our citizens were preparing to cut down the vines and burn them. Leo Kelley was one of those when he accidentally discovered a peculiar looking worm crawling on the vines. By closely observing the worms it was discovered that they were eating the aphids. This caused him to keep a watch on the worms, and soon they developed into full grown ladybugs. The latter multiplied very rapidly and soon stripped every leaf and twig clean of the aphids. They would then change their location, and the work of destruction went merrily on.—Paindealer.

**South From Bend**  
Earl B. Houston of Bend, who came in with a load of passengers Monday evening, says that things up that way point toward railroad building south from Bend in the near future. The passenger train for the past few days have been hauling an extra coach for officials of the road, and men with timber holdings to the south have been on the ground.
