She did not explain to the police till the husband was safely in the station. He was locked up and later got out on bail. Mrs. Rupp went home to cook supper for the hungry children.

Beautiful Nurse Now Accused



Miss Emma Elizabeth Krill, a beautiful young nurse, is under arrest in Utica, N. Y., on a charge of poisoning Dr. Stanley E. Tron.

The state plans to prove that Miss Krill was jealous of a pretty Italian girl, and in consequence put Dr. Tron out of the way with a dose of morphine.

Miss Krill, it has been learned, was born in Mountainville, Orange county, N. Y., July 30, 1889, one of the three daughters of Joseph H. and Ida Krill. When she was about 8 years old her mother disappeared simultaneously with the disappearance of a Dr. Friedenburg.

Miss Krill was for a time employed in the Middletown state hospital for the insane, and later in the City hospital in Hudson, N. Y. She then went to New York, where she became acquainted with Dr. Tron. For a time she was in an Italian hospital, and later in the Lying-in hospital. There her engagement to Dr. Tron was announced.

She followed to Utica shortly after his removal there.
