Four Corporations!
Alleging that its charges are insufficient to yield a return sufficient to pay operating expenses, and that its business is being conducted at a net yearly loss of \$39,745, the Home Telephone company of Southern Oregon has filed a petition with the state railroad commission, petitioning under the public utilities law for an increase in phone rentals over those now charged in Medford and Jacksonville. —Medford Mail-Tribune.

Other Counties, Too
Said to recover 50,000 acres of land alleged to be fraudulently secured by the Hyde-Benson conspirators from the state, has been instituted by the attorney general. This land is in Lane, Lane, Crook, Clackamas, Hood River, Klamath and Jackson counties. It is alleged that it was secured through dummy locators.

Must Have Requisitions
According to a ruling of the Douglas county court, any officer or person who purchases any supplies, material or employs the services of any assistant, or incurs any other liability, unless he has a requisition therefor, signed by one of the officers will be deemed to have purchased such supplies or material, or employed such assistance on his own account and must pay therefor. —Roseburg Review.

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Man 106 Years Old Today Tells How to Live Properly

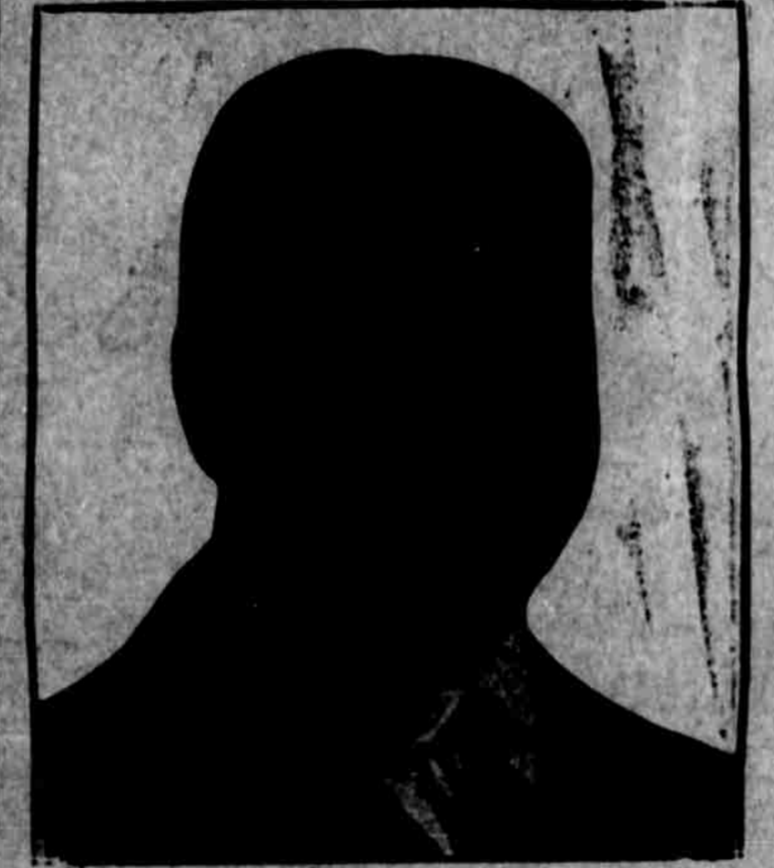
PARIS, Aug. 18.—Pierre Schamel Roy, the only living man whose hand ever clasped that of Napoleon Bonaparte, today celebrated his 106th birthday by rising at 5 o'clock and taking a long walk through the streets of Neuilly and along the banks of the Seine. Later in the day he was tendered an informal reception by his fellow imperialists. Quite poor, unmarried, Roy lives in a two-room apartment, his only income being a government pension of 30 cents a day. Imperialist sympathizers occasionally help the old man with donations. His mind is clear as a bell, his hand is perfectly steady, yet he was "play-boy" the King of Rome, Napoleon's beloved "L'Algerin," in the palace at Versailles. It was only at St. Helena that Roy remembers seeing the emperor. There he saw him four times.

Until Roy was 60 years old, he was rather a heavy drinker. He drank wine. Since then he has drunk milk principally, though now and then he still takes a glass of wine with meals. He has never taken any particular care of himself, attributing his long life to open-air walks, lack of excessive wine drinking "when he was a young man," and to the fact that his father and mother were both very young when he was born, the one being 17 and the other 19. He has always eaten whatever and as much as he chose.

"I have lived through the reigns," said Roy, "of two emperors and three kings, not counting nine presidents under the third republic. Yet, as you see me today, I can read and write without glasses, and mend my own clothes. I learned to sew when very young, and later was costume designer at the opera. Never having had a wife, the knowledge has served me in good stead.

"You ask me whom I believe to be the greatest man since Napoleon. My answer is that there has been none since to stand a comparison. Eugenics, I believe, more than any other one thing, have been responsible for my 106 years. Eugenics seems to be modern enough as a study, but I'm an example of the children and healthy young couples can bring into the world when properly mated. I never married because I was happy enough as a bachelor. It was not because I had no use for women. Why, you know," and here Roy smiled again roughly. "I flirted with the fair sex until I was 55."

Bryan and Professor Moore at Odds Over Mexican Policy



WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 18.—Professor John Bassett Moore, counsel for the state department, the man on whom President Wilson depends for his international law, and Secretary Bryan are at odds over the Mexican policy of the government. It has just leaked out from the department that Professor Moore, who is the highest authority on international law in the United States, thinks the recent actions of the state department and the president, for that matter, in connection with Mexico are without precedent, and lack the authority of recognized international law.

So far there has been no break between the president, Mr. Bryan and Professor Moore. But the expert is wholly dissatisfied with the course of the government in regard to Mexico. It has just been learned that he was very strongly opposed to the trip of Commissioner John Lind, sent as a mediator to Mexico City.

"What do you think Mr. Lind can accomplish down there?" Mr. Bryan was reported to have asked the international law expert.

"He can get his picture in the newspapers," Professor Moore is reported to have replied.

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MORE LANDS TO BE DESIGNATED

SECRETARY OF THE INTERIOR IS PREPARING TO ADD TO THE ANPA HOMESTEADS CAN TAKE UP

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 18.—Public lands that have been surveyed and are unreserved and non-irrigable are to be designated for entry as enlarged homesteads, under a new ruling by Secretary of the Interior Lane.

Large tracts will be so designated at once, and the entrymen will have to determine the availability of each quarter section of such land when he visits the district land office.

The recent practice has been that the department waited for petition in each case before it designated a tract as ready for enlarged homestead entry.

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
