### Lake County Fair

Lake county is to hold a fair this year. This is the encouraging information given out by County Judge Daly, but inasmuch as details have not been arranged, no definite information can be given out as yet. A fair board of three will be appointed by the county court. Judge Daly has requested Commissioner Anderson, who resides at Lake, to name one member from the northern part of the county, and until he is heard from no members will be appointed. The exact date have not been set, but the fair will probably be held in the early part of October.—Lake County Banner.

### Forest Highway

In response to numerous inquiries from Gold Hill and Rogue River regarding the location of the highway to be improved, provided the road bond issue carries, County Judge Tom Velle has written the following open letter:

"To the citizens of Gold Hill and Rogue River—It is the county court's intention to improve the county road through both Gold Hill and Rogue River, provided the bond issue carries. They will be on the paved county highway."—Medford Mail Tribune.

### Some Failed

Station per cent of those who took the spring state teachers' examination failed. Now this compares with former examinations is not known, as it has not been the custom to keep this record. There were 1,563 applicants who took the examination, the largest number yet given the examination at one time in Oregon. Of these 1,124 earned their certificates, 128 took the examination for exemption, and 310 failed. This figures out that 72 per cent received certificates, 12 per cent wrote for exemption, and 16 per cent failed.

### The only countries in Europe that have no organized movement for woman suffrage are Spain, Greece and the Grand Duchy of Luxembourg. All the others are represented in the International Woman Suffrage Alliance.



## Keno Coming to Front by Its Big Resources

(Special Correspondent)

KENO, Aug. 26.—Four outfits are now putting logs into the Klamath River to be taken to the Klamath Falls mills. They are mostly for the Big Basin Lumber company. Between thirty-five and forty men are at work in the timber, cutting and hauling logs.

Keno is bound to come to the front. Why? Because it is located at the edge of a large timber belt, with as good a sawmill location as there is in Oregon, close by a river where a large amount of logs can be stored. The timber for miles can be brought to the mill with a down-hill pull.

A railroad line has been surveyed from Worden to Keno, and when built should make shipping easy, as the railway and the mill site are only a few hundred yards apart, and there is an electric line near the spot. This power plant has been put in for the purpose of establishing pumping plants along the Klamath River for irrigation purposes. A large acreage of high lands will thus be brought under cultivation.

Two river boats are now engaged in the work of towing logs from the Keno logging camps to the sawmills at Klamath Falls.

J. O. Oley is keeping a boarding house, and so is Miss Doten. Besides these the private homes are housing the large number of men working around here. Burns are in demand for the team.

Crops are good hereabouts, and harvesting is in full blast. There is quite a bit of fruit all through this neighborhood.
