Lake county is to hold a fair this year. Some Failed

More than half of those who took the spring state teacher's examination failed. How this compares with former examinations is not known, as it has not been the custom to keep this record. There were 1,653 applicants who took the examination, the largest number yet given the examination at one time in Oregon. Of these 1,226 earned their certificates, 182 took the examination for exemptions, and 230 failed. This figure set that 12 per cent received certificate, 12 per cent wrote for exemptions, and 16 per cent failed.

The only countries in Europe that have no organized movement for women suffrage are Spain, Greece and the Grand Duchy of Luxembourg. All the others are represented in the International Woman Suffrage Alliance.
