Hero Man Says Klamath Falls Could Pull Off Biggest Event in the History of Motor Races for Stock Cars.

Mr. Wilson declared that he would be the first one to fill an entry blank if the race is secured.

MESSAGE TO BE READ TOMORROW

PRESIDENT WILL READ HIS MESSAGE ON MEXICAN SITUATION TO JOINT SESSION OF NATIONAL CONGRESS

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 25.—President Wilson has announced that he will read his message on the Mexican situation before a joint session of Congress tomorrow at 1 o'clock.

The president has asked the members of the senate and house foreign committees to confer with him tonight regarding the message.

Speculation is rife whether President Wilson will deliver his message to Congress tomorrow. Officials deny that he is holding the message as a club over Huerta, or that he has issued an ultimatum to Huerta that the message will be read unless he accepts mediation.

The message goes to the printer tonight. It has already been read by Bryan, and will be communicated to the committee on foreign relations.

PETITION ASKS FOR ELECTION ON CITY HALL BONDS

COUNCIL ASKED TO CALL SPECIAL ELECTION

Business Men and Property Owners

Want Steps Taken at Once to Authorize Bonds for the Erection of City Hall, So That Work can Commence Early in Spring—Location on Fifth Street, Near Klamath

Klamath Falls will probably have a new city hall.

At least this will be the result if the wishes of a large number of business men and property owners are followed.

A petition is being circulated and will be presented to the city council this evening, asking that body to pass an ordinance calling an election for the purpose of voting bonds with which to erect a suitable building for the home of the city officials, on lots 9 and 10 in block 75 of Klamath Addition.

At a special election held for the purpose bonds were voted by the people of Klamath Falls for city hall purposes. On account of the tangle in the charter at that time, the bonds were never sold.

Attorneys for Eastern bond houses have declared that the present city charter is a perfectly legal instrument, and it is anticipated that there will be no difficulty in disposing of the bonds should the people of the city vote in favor of their issuance.

WORLDS OF HAY AT FORT KLAMATH

PEOPLE WITNESS SPECTACLE OF MAMMOTH TRACTION ENGINE HAULING TWENTY-TWO TONS OF TIMOTHY HAY

A mammoth traction engine pulling three big trucks on which were piled twenty-two tons of baled timothy hay, was the sight that greeted the people of Fort Klamath this forenoon.

William Baldwin, who returned from there today, saw, not only the twenty-two tons on the trucks, but hundreds of tons in the fields and barns.

"Nor is the hay the only crops up there," said Mr. Baldwin. "I went up to the J. W. Cox ranch to set up a twelve-foot header binder, and I saw some of the prettiest grain fields around the Fort that I've ever seen in any country. The twenty-two tons of hay that passed through the Fort while I was there was hauled by the Duffy Brothers, and was for the Pelican Bay Lumber company, to be fed for their teams. So you see it was home-grown hay going to a home market."

Birds Are to Be Turned Loose on Adams and Merrill Ranches Near Merrill, Madrox Ranch on Lost River, Bord Place at Olene and the Bowne Ranch Near Bonanza—The County Being Well Supplied

Deputy Game Warden C. M. Ramsby states that he is expecting a shipment of China Pheasants any day.

There will be between 75 and 100 birds in the first shipment, and they are to be turned loose on the ranches of J. F. Adams and N. S. Merrill, in the Merrill section; J. A. Madrox ranch on Lost River, Rex Bord ranch at Olene and the F. J. Bowne ranch near Bonanza.

A car of fingerling trout will arrive from the Bonnerville hatchery on the night of September 5th.

Tonight a load of trout from Spencer Creek will be taken by Warden Ramsby and F. Zim Baldwin to Rock Creek. A portion of the trout will be placed in a lake on Aspen Lake mountain. These will be delivered on pack horses by Frank Courtade.

GREAT BENEFITS ANTICIPATED FROM NEW STUDY OF SCHOOL HYGIENE — INTERNATIONAL CONGRESS MEETS TODAY

The Fourth International Congress on School Hygiene convenes today at Buffalo, N. Y., and will continue in session till the 1st of September.

Those in charge are particularly anxious to have reports of the results secured through the practical application of scientific facts and procedures of school hygiene. The benefits of school hygiene has been largely confined to city schools, the rural and village schools having so far received very scant attention in this respect.

The delegates to this congress are selected from the different associations throughout the country, and an additional number appointed by the governors of the states.

In Oregon Governor West appointed four, and the National Health Hygiene Association appointed five. Of the last mentioned, Dr. Fred Westerman of this city was appointed to represent Southern Oregon, but at the last moment found it impossible to attend.

The county court Saturday appointed J. O. Hamaker of Bonanza, county sealer of weights and measures, in accordance with the provisions of a new law passed by the last legislature defining the duties of the state sealer, and authorizing the appointment of deputy and county sealers.

The law provides that it shall be the duty of the county sealer to visit at least once in each year every place of business where any scale, weight or measure, or any device for ascertaining the quantity of any commodity is kept for the purpose of trade,
