VENICE, Italy, Aug. 27.—The desire for rapid transit has killed another romantic custom in romantic Venice. With the formal inauguration today of a power boat service on the historic Venetian canals, the gondola's doom is sealed, as was the doom of the entry in London and New York

when the taxis were put on the streets.

There have been one or two motor boats on the Venice canals before, but they were rarities.

Twenty of the chugging, sputtering boats, driven by erstwhile gondoliers, were put in service today, and twenty more will be launched shortly.

SAYS CO. COURT PUTS HIM OFF

OLD RESIDENT, WHOSE SON WENT TO HAVE A GUARDIAN NAMED, SAYS HE HAS BEEN HELD OFF NEEDLESSLY

"I have been here since the 24th of June, trying to get Judge Worden and the members of the county court to take some action in my case and save me my property. During all of that time I have been put off from

day to day, and I have stayed here all the time, paying my expenses. Now this delay, I do not think is my fault, and I'd like to know if I should shoulder all the expense."

This is the position in which Steven A. Penny, for years a respected Klamath county farmer finds himself. The feeble veteran complains bitterly at the continual delays he says he encounters in getting some action by the court.

Penny's son, William Penny, some time ago petitioned the court for a guardian over his father, whom, he said, was becoming mentally unbalanced. The father fought this, declaring that it was a scheme to rob himself and his aged wife of their property and savings gained by years of toil.

Captain J. W. Siemens was appointed guardian for Penny by the court a little while ago, but last week he tendered his resignation, owing, it is stated, to the complications in the case. Since then no successor has been appointed, and the father claims his son is appropriating to his own use the profits of his parent's farm and income.

SCHOOL SUPERINTENDENT PREPARES A LIST OF THE TEXT-BOOKS TO BE USED WITH NEW STUDY COURSE

County School Superintendent Fred Peterson has completed a list of the textbooks that the grade schools will use in connection with the new course of study, which has just been arranged by the state department of public instruction.

The books to be used by each grade are as follows:

First Grade—Wheeler's graded primer, Sloan's primary reader, first book.

Second Grade—Wheeler's first reader, Wheeler's graded second reader.

Third Grade—Wheeler's third reader, Hicks' Champion spelling book, writing lessons for primary grades, Numbers Step by Step.

Fourth Grade—Wheeler's graded fourth reader, Hicks' Champion spelling book, writing lessons for primary grades, Numbers Step by Step, Kimball's Elementary English book 1.

Fifth Grade—Wheeler's graded fifth reader, Hicks' Champion spelling book, Palmer's method of business writing, complete arithmetic by White, World geography, Kimball's elementary book 1, introductory history by Bourne & Benton, Primer of Sanitation by Ritchie.

Sixth Grade—Wheeler's graded sixth reader, Hicks' Champion spelling book, Palmer's method of business writing, complete arithmetic by White, World geography, Kimball's elementary book 2, a school history of the United States by Maco.

Seventh Grade—Edison's Grammar School reader, book 3, Hicks' Champion spelling book, Palmer's method of business writing, complete arithmetic by White, World geography, Kimball's elementary book 2, a school history of the United States by Maco.

Eighth Grade—Edison's Grammar School reader book 4, Hicks' Champion spelling book, Palmer's method of business writing, Agriculture for beginners, complete arithmetic, civil government by Reinach, Kimball's elementary English, book 3, a school history of the United States.

ROUND THE LAKE RACE ENDORSED

AUTOMOBILE MAN SAYS MAJORITY OF THE TOWN'S BUSINESS MEN ARE HEARTILY IN FAVOR OF SUCH AN EVENT

The business men in general and the automobile owners in particular are thoroughly imbued with the idea of having an automobile endurance race around Upper Klamath Lake next fall.

W. T. Lee, one of the proprietors of the Central garage, has taken an active interest in starting the movement of obtaining a permit from the A. A. A., fixing a date on which to hold the contest, and arousing the natives to a realization of the benefits resulting from the world-wide publicity of a race meet here.

"This is an opportunity that must not be passed up," said Mr. Lee. "I've talked the matter over with many of the business men, and, with an exception or two, all are heartily in favor of putting on this race. The ones who made any objection, made it on the belief that it would be too dangerous to try to race over the course contemplated."

"They are not fully aware of just what an endurance race is. There will be no speeding round the course at a high rate, for an endurance race is not a matter of speed, but durability. The object is to see what cars will stand the gruelling grind of the rough roads and steep grades."
