MANY WOULD WED NOTORIOUS YOUNG WOMEN

United Press Service SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 28.—With Narsha Warrington and Lola Norris both waiting to go on the stand and testify, and only minor testimony regarding the Reno trip being given, the sensation of the Caminetti proceedings this afternoon was the admission that both girls have been flooded with letters containing proposals of marriage.

These letters are from all parts of the continent, from coast to coast. The missives are even flooding the office of Federal Judge Van Fleet, many being addressed in his care. The judge, the prosecutors and the girls have refused to make public the names of the amorous swains. In addition to the proposals of marriage, the girls have also been tendered theatrical engagements.

OTHER GIRLS TO TESTIFY ABOUT CAMINETTI JR

WOMEN AGAIN IN THE MORBID AUDIENCE

Name Crush of People, Eager for Morbid Details, Fight for Entrance to the Court Room—Prosecution Says It Has Additional Witnesses to Appear Against Caminetti When the Time Comes During the Trial.

United Press Service SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 28.—Eager for the expected salacious details of the infamous intrigue, a crowd as big as at the Digs trial thronged the entrance to the court room when the trial of Drew Caminetti for a Mann white slave law violation commenced this afternoon.

Many women pushed and struggled to get seats well toward the front. The prosecution admits that it will have the evidence of two young Sacramento girls, one a telephone operator, the other a school girl, which, if permitted, will show some sensational things in regard to Caminetti's habits.

"The bars will be let down for these stories if Caminetti takes the stand and opens up on the subject of why he and Digs left Sacramento," said Roche.

Jerome Goes to Tell Premier His Opinion



It is probable that the court house in the little Canadian town of Sherbrooke will be the scene of as great a legal battle as has been known in the Dominion for many years. For here it is that Harry Thaw, backed by the millions of his family, is to make another stand for liberty.

United Press Service SHERBROOKE, Quebec, Aug. 28.—That an attempt is to be made to kidnap Harry Kendall Thaw and forcibly return him to Matteson an asylum for the criminal insane in New York, from which he escaped a short time ago, was the report current on the streets today.

The arrival of a party from New York strengthened this in the minds of many. Thaw scouts the idea as ridiculous. Attorneys for the notorious slayer of Stanford White, however, take a more serious view of the matter. They are alternately guarding their client, and will keep this vigil day and night, to frustrate any plan that may be under way to kidnap Thaw.

Following the action of the court here yesterday in denying the right of the state of New York to be a party to the case, Attorney Jerome, who as prosecutor, sent Thaw to Matteson, has gone to Quebec to appeal to Premier Gouin.

NO INTEREST IS SHOWN IN VOTE TO TAKE PROJECT

ONLY TWENTY-EIGHT PER CENT VOTED AT ALL

Of These, Eleven Per Cent Favored the Change, and Remainder Voted to Have the Government Continue in Charge—Similar Conditions Met With in the Vote on the Salt River Project in Arizona

Although blanks were sent to all of the water users under the First unit of the Klamath Project, only 28 per cent voted on the question of turning the operation and maintenance of the First unit over to the Klamath Water Users Association.

A total of 369 registered voters were sent to the land owners under the ditch. Returns registry receipts were received from 225. Returns were marked "mailed for," and 25 were not heard from in any way. Based upon the total sent out, 45, or 11 per cent, voted in favor of the water users taking over the operation and maintenance. The vote of 63, or 17 per cent, favored continued operation by the reclamation service.

When the matter was submitted to the water users to vote on, the conditions were outlined, one of them being that the operation and maintenance of the First unit would be transferred to the water users if the majority of those casting ballots at a representative vote favored it. Those not voting would be considered voting against the proposition.

Taking the attitude that the conditions outlined by the reclamation service for the taking over of the First unit were not those desired by the water users, the Klamath Water Users Association took the matter up with the individual water users, and instead of voting, the majority signed a petition to Secretary Lane of the interior department, asking for a joint meeting of water users and reclamationists to arrange the terms of transfer.

The reclamation service holds that the conditions outlined in the letter to the water users were agreed upon by the water users at a meeting with Mr. Patch and Mr. Hopson early in the summer.

The same lack of interest was also shown in the recent election on the Salt River project, when the same question was submitted. There only 19.1 per cent of the individual owners, representing 17.1 per cent of the acreage, voted on the question.

WILL NOT BE A CANDIDATE FOR THE EXECUTIVE

DE LA HERRA'S CHIEF OF POLICE

American Troops Are Expected to Along the Mexican Border to Serve the Remaining Term of the Administration—Senator Chamberlain That Mexico Remains in Status Quo Until After October Election.

United Press Service WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 28.—Ambassador John Lind today told the administration that Mexico has made considerable improvements since it was announced that Lind was leaving the country.

He says that the Mexican border virtually runs today with American troops in various spots along the border, but no further westward.

Lind cannot announce the name of his successor until after the election, but he has named the White House that he will be in Mexico City tomorrow.

It is believed that Lind's departure may be a factor in the reclamation project's request for the removal of conditions.

United Press Service MEXICO CITY (via Saltzman), Aug. 28.—Secretary Chamberlain's news note to Lind was published today.

The most important point in that note is constitutionally excluded from the presidency.

The message given the way for further negotiations. It does not state that negotiations will be accepted unconditionally.

The announcement that Lind will not be a candidate in coming election of President is being regarded as a blow to the reclamation project, although he has kept out of the fight, being an executive and congressman, more than a warrior.
