**Lake Fair Dates**  
A county fair board composed of Harry Bailey of Lakeview, S. B. Chandler of Crescent Creek, and F. A. Remington of Lake has been appointed by the county court, to have charge of the Lake County Fair to be held in Lakeview this year. The fair board at their meeting Thursday night decided on the dates that the Lake county exhibits would be shown on Thursday, Friday and Saturday, October 2, 3 and 4. W. F. Falco has been chosen by the fair board as their general manager and secretary.—Lakeview Herald.

**Kane Creek Strife**  
W. G. Womack, the prospector, is showing some very rich free gold quartz taken from his Kane Creek claims, the Revenue, Ground Floor and Blue Bird. The ledge is four feet wide on the surface, and has been cut forty feet deep in several places along the 700 feet that the vein has been traced on the surface. Returns from shipments made the Selby smelter show values running from \$6,750 to \$69,000 a ton. Seattle parties are due to look at the prospects.—Medford Mail Tribune.

**Fish Doing Well**  
Fred Chintaker of East Lake reports the 25,000 rainbow trout placed in the lake a year ago as doing fine. The Pauline Lake, stocked at the same time with 10,000, are thriving equally well. State Game Warden Finley has shipped 26,000 more trout for these lakes, which will arrive in bond in a few days. The fish already there have grown in one year from fries to fish from five to ten inches long.—La Pine Intermountain.

"Words can't describe the feeling one has when one first looks over the rim of Crater Lake," said E. W. Murphy, a Los Angeles broker, who, with his family, is stopping at the Pelican Bay Lodge. Mr. Murphy left Los Angeles in his big Premier car on July 29th, and has made every side trip in connection with his tour from Southern California to Seattle and back to Klamath.

"The boulevards up Mt. Rainier make the trip a more delightful auto outing, but Crater Lake more than justifies the hard drive to get to it. "We climbed Mt. Hood, went through the Washington timber reserve, motored up the Columbia River, and made any number of side trips to famous resorts, but Klamath county beats them all for a summering place," declared Mr. Murphy.

There is going to be a big crop of grain here this year, as but very little damage was done by the frost.
