Schools Experimental Station

His plan is to put into practical operation the teaching of agriculture in the school by providing an acre plot at each school house to be used as a model farm by the pupils. Crops will be planted, cultivated and harvested. Intensive farming will be done.

Combine Work and School
Miss Linnie Rector, principal of one of the schools of New York city, went to four manufacturers in her school district and asked them to allow some of their girls to go to school part of the time, that they might be made more efficient in their work. They all agreed, and sixteen girls were sent to school one week and worked in the factory the next, the manufacturers paying their wages for both periods.

DRUG HABIT IS CLUTCHING PARIS

ART STUDENTS IN LATIN QUARTER ARE CHARGED WITH OPERATING THEIR OWN OPIUM DEN

PARIS, Aug. 28.—The ordinances directed against the sale of opium, cocaine and other habit forming drugs, went into effect today. They were the result of exposures following an investigation by the police department into charges that students of the Latin Quarter and residents of the Montmartre district have been running private drug dens.

Wholesale arrests were made, but the authorities failed to obtain convictions because the statutes were not comprehensive enough. The investigation disclosed that the drug habit had grown alarmingly in the two sections mentioned.

"Little Lord Fauntleroy"



He who was "Little Lord Fauntleroy" will become governor of the Philippines. President Wilson has sent to the senate the nomination of F. Burton Harrison, member of congress from New York city, and son of Mrs. Francis Burton Harrison, author of that famous little story, "Little Lord Fauntleroy."

Mr. Harrison has been in politics for many years, and has served several terms in congress, where he has come to be recognized as a tariff expert. He holds an important place on the ways and means committee of the house. Chairman Underwood has given to him through two congresses the preparation of important schedules of his tariff bills.

In fact, Harrison, though ostensibly a Tammany man, is one of the wealthy young men of New York city whom Tammany Hall made an attempt to annex several years ago, and is considered one of the best informed members of congress. He is one of the few representatives from New York city for whom there is respect in Washington.

Miss Elizabeth Harris, daughter of Congressman Harris of Massachusetts, was her father's secretary at a salary of \$1,500 a year. Recently she resigned, as she told her father that if she were a son, instead of a daughter, he would be encouraging her to go into business for herself, and that is what she is going to do, having chosen the insurance business against burglary, in which, no doubt, she will have many women customers.
