CONSTITUTION ATTACKED BY A GOVERNOR

WISCONSIN MAN SCORES LEGISLATORS

Closing Session of Governorial Conference at Colorado Springs is Thrown into Dire Confusion by the Utterances of McGovern. With Whom Governors of Illinois, Arizona and Kansas Fully Agreed

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo., Aug. 29.—The Governors Conference, in session here, concluded this afternoon with a majority of the members greatly perturbed over an attack on the federal constitution made by Governor Francis E. McGovern of Wisconsin.

William Spry, governor of Utah, was in the midst of an address on the government of the United States, and he declared that the framers of the constitution were inspired, and the constitution itself was divine.

"I don't," interrupted McGovern. "I think the constitution is the most beautiful scheme ever invented to enable legislators to do nothing."

"I favor small, well paid legislatures, with the members so directly responsible to the people that they dare not disobey instructions."

"The supporters of the present system virtually say that they are willing that the people be poorly armed for the fight of the masses against organized capital," he said in concluding.

McGovern's views were approved by Hunt of Arizona, Dunne of Illinois and Hodges of Kansas.

Much Powder Used

GARRISON SEES FORT SNELLING

SECRETARY OF WAR IS DECIDING WHETHER HISTORIC MILITARY POST WILL BE ENLARGED OR QUITTED

ST. PAUL, Aug. 29.—Lindley M. Garrison, secretary of war, today inspected Fort Snelling with a view to ordering changes that will mean either the enlargement or abandonment of the oldest fort in the Northwest. Secretary Garrison is "getting in" on the problem of what to do with the fort where Secretary Henry Stimson, under President Taft, "got off."

The old question of whether Fort Snelling is to be abandoned or sufficient of the Minnesota River bottom land acquired to make a brigade post was up again today. Secretary Garrison inspected the old army building on the Mississippi River levee here. It was reported again today that the headquarters of the Fifth Brigade will be moved from Omaha to St. Paul.

WOOLEN MILL TO BE THE SUBJECT

COMMITTEE WILL MEET TO ASCERTAIN WHETHER OR NOT KLAMATH FALLS NEEDS ONE. MAY SEND COMMITTEE

"Will a woolen mill be beneficial to Klamath Falls?" is the subject that will be discussed this afternoon by the manufactures committee of the Chamber of Commerce, and George J. Walton, J. W. Stephens and J. F. McGuire, the special committee named by the Chamber of Commerce.

The committee will take up the matter from the local standpoint, and will endeavor to learn what class of people will be employed by the concern, what wages will be paid, etc. It is probable that they may designate some of their number to go to confer with President John P. Wilber of the company.

The concern making entrance here is the Sautian Woolen mill. In letters to the Chamber of Commerce the firm says it manufactures blankets, mackinaws, wool matting and mattresses, and uses between 500,000 and 1,000,000 pounds of wool a year, employing from 75 to 125 people.

Germany and Denmark may look good to persons who have resided there all their lives, but Chris Dierckson, after forty years' residence in the United States, found that his old home was somewhat behind the times. Mr. Dierckson, who has long farmed on Tule Lake, has just returned from a trip to the old countries.

"I will say, though," said Mr. Dierckson, "that the German and Danish farmers have made great improvements to their lands by using fertilizers, etc. Their crops are twice as large as I used to remember them."

Parsons Commission Quits

Because of the necessity of his returning to the United States to resume the professorship of political science at the University of Pennsylvania, Dr. Leo S. Parsons has resigned as one of the American members of the joint Panama commission. Dr. Parsons P. Faulkner, the other American commissioner, retains his position. HUERTA IS NOW READY TO HEAR PLANS OF U. S.

BELIEVED HE WILL ACCEPT MOST OF THEM

American Arriving From the Interior of Mexico Say the People Will Break Out in More Serious Strife Unless the Suggestions Made by Lind—They Believe That He Should Head Them

VERA CRUZ, Aug. 29.—Huerta is now disposed to accept the most of the proposals made by President Wilson.

This was made known to Ambassador Lind this morning.

Several hundred Americans, coming from the interior of Mexico, believe that Huerta is considering accepting mediation by the United States. They believe he should stand firm.

In the event that Huerta accepts mediation, country wide rioting is predicted.
