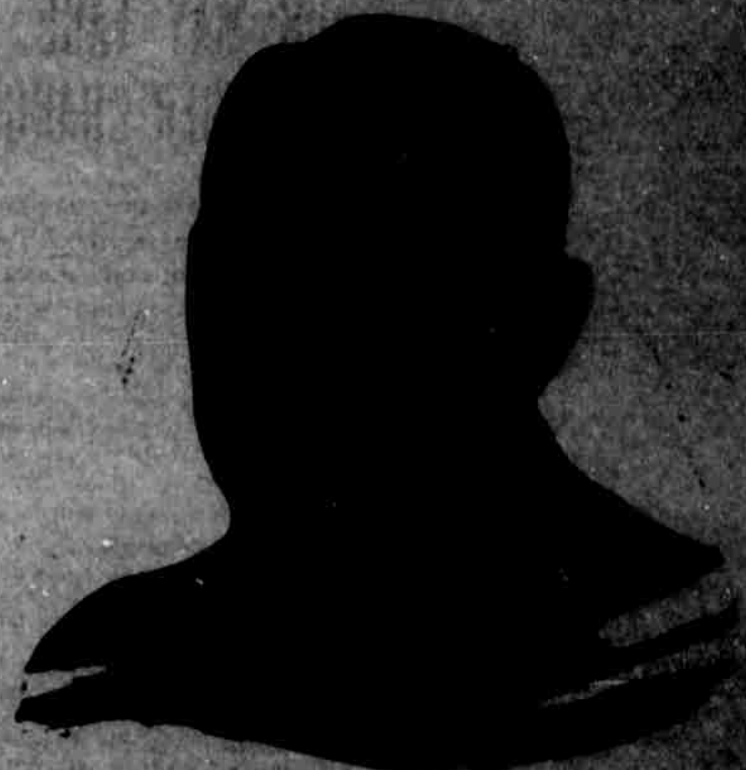
French Laborites Are Sadly Split in Twain

PARIS, Aug. 29.—Already split
into "Red" and "Yellow," or revolu-
tionary and conservative groups, the
French General Confederation of La-
bor has been further divided over
the measures the syndicalists propose
to adopt as a demonstration against
the government and the new three-
year service army law and the decree
ordering the liberal portion of the
army to remain an extra year under
the colors.
One faction today is advocating a
general strike. The other, and the
larger group, is inviting labor unions
to redouble their activities, and is
encouraging growing opposition in
the working classes. This last is the
official attitude of the Confederation
of Labor, and as the "Reds" are domi-
nant, this rather vague program is
taken by the French government as
a sign that the numerous arrests of
labor leaders, for anti-military teach-
ings, have had effect. It is predicted
that the Confederation will scarcely
need the dissolution order from the
government, but that it will fail of
its own accord.
Whatever happens there is a strong
movement on foot throughout France
among the labor leaders to build up
a new Confederation upon the ruins
of the old, patterning as far as possi-
ble after the American Federation of
Labor in the United States.
Low Cost Pay of Women
Wages of many women in St. Paul
have been reduced because of the
working of the new law which pre-
scribes a maximum work day of ten
hours and a maximum of 55 hours a
week. In some instances wages have
been reduced as much as 25 per cent.
Most of those affected are waitresses.
Few mercantile establishments are af-
fected, as they were already within
the limit.

DAIRY CONTESTS IN THE SCHOOLS

**EXPERIMENT WILL BE TRIED
OUT IN POLK COUNTY—AGRI-
CULTURAL COLLEGE WILL AS-
SIST IN THE WORK**
SALEM, Aug. 29.—With a view of
arousing greater interest in dairying
and in the work in rural schools,
State Superintendent of Public In-
struction Churchill has concluded to
inaugurate in co-operation with the
state agricultural college a dairying
contest in the rural schools.
The work will be under direction
of W. A. Barr, who represents the
United States dairy division and the
extension department of the college.
The plan will be to try out the con-
test thoroughly in one county, and
then extend the work.
Polk county has been selected as
first in which to begin operations.
All boys and girls in the seventh
and higher grades will be allowed to
participate, and a list of attractive
prizes will be prepared.

NEW YORK, Aug. 29.—Charles F.
Murphy, the boss of Tammany Hall,
has again started his enemies, who
think he is stupid, with a flash of
political daring that has taken them
off their feet for the moment. His
selection of Edward E. McCall, for-
mer justice of the state supreme
court and present chairman of the
board of public service commis-
sioners, in place of William J. Gaynor,
who sought the nomination with all
his strength, was not expected.
Beyond that Murphy has just un-
dermined a governor of the state. Few
persons thought he had the nerve to
fight William Sulzer to a finish. Yet
he is doing so. With that contest
still on his hands he has dared to
turn down Gaynor, perhaps the most
powerful and resourceful mayor of
any large American city.
