PLEADS; FINED, PINCHED AGAIN

AFTER PAYING \$25 AND COSTS FOR SHOOTING QUAIL, GREEK IS ARRESTED FOR ANOTHER VIOLATION

M. Conella this afternoon pleaded guilty to a charge of shooting quail out of season. He was fined \$25 and costs by Justice of the Peace E. W. Gowen.

Immediately afterwards Conella was arrested again upon complaint of Deputy District Game Warden Hamby, who pointed out that the statutes provide that persons not naturalized must pay a license fee of \$25. This Conella, who is a Greek, failed to do.

He will be tried late today on the second charge. Conella is an employee of the Pelican Bay Lumber company.

Woman to Inspect Streets
Philadelphia has a woman as street inspector, Director Cook having appointed Mrs. Edith W. Pierce, secretary of the Home and School League, as inspector at a salary of \$1,300 a year. Mrs. Pierce, instead of being assigned a district, will cover the entire city, giving her attention to schools and homes. She will organize sectional associations for the purpose of keeping the streets, sidewalks and schools clean.

Miss Anna M. Shreve, who has had charge of the nursery for twenty-six years at Girard College in Philadelphia, has had 1,596 boys under her charge. She is regarded as a mother by the children. There are 1,590 boys in the school, and the kind of management necessary that they may all be clothed and fed properly requires a great deal of thinking on the part of the good woman.

Socialist Soldiers Are Now Seeking Decoration

ROME, Aug. 29.—Six soldiers who refused the gold medal offered them by the government for unusual military valor in the Turkish-Italian war, and who later repented their action, today were allowed to formally retract their refusal and put in application for the prizes.

At the time of the presentation,

when several other soldiers were given medals for valor, they remained away, declaring that, as socialists, who did not believe in war, they could not accept the medals.

In their petitions presented today they declared they were forced to take that action by their social friends, and that if the government will give them the medals they will accept them and prize them highly.

Here to Be Married

Superintendent A. E. Kasei of Milwaukee says that kindergarten teachers marry more certainly than others and attributes the fact to the "motherliness" that the work develops. He adds that there is no promotion for the kindergarten teacher except marriage. Barroom Beneath Church

Although there had been a raid on July 30, a barroom is still being maintained in the basement of the First Bohemian church in New York. The complaint was made by Police Captain Henry to the supreme court. In the raid a large quantity of wine and imported liquors were seized.

The Adams farm in Richland county, North Dakota, and the Keystone farm in Matador county have been sold for something over \$1,000,000, and the big tracts will be cut up into small farms. The two farms aggregate 15,360 acres.
