## ARKANSAS USES ELECTRIC CHAIR

**NEGRO ELECTROCUTED BRAGS FOR DAYS THAT HE WILL BE THE FIRST ONE TO USE THE CONTRIVANCE**

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., Sept. 5.—Undeniably proud of the "distinction" of being the first to die in Arkansas' newly installed electric chair, Lee Sims, a negro, went to his death smiling here today.  
Sims attacked a white woman last July. For days before his death, he bragged openly of the fact that he would be the first human being to die in the chair.  
The chair cost the state \$702. It was tested on a steer last week.

**IS CHARGED WITH AGAIN LOCKING THE DOORS OF ESTABLISHMENT WHERE MANY ARE EMPLOYED**

NEW YORK, Sept. 5.—Max Blank, one of the proprietors of the Triangle Shirtwaist company, in whose factory 147 women and girls were burned to death March 25, 1911, today went to trial in the Court of Special Sessions, charged with locking the doors of his new factory in Fifth avenue.  
Inspector Dugan of the fire prevention bureau, is expected to testify that he found the Triangle factory doors padlocked, with 150 persons working there on August 4.

## National Forest Maps Prepared for Public

WASHINGTON, D. C., Sept. 5.—A series of maps of national forests, which will be of value to campers, hunters and tourists, as well as to local forest users, is being issued by the United States forest service.  
The third of the series completed and put out is a 20x24 inch folder of the Wallowa national forest of Oregon. Forest boundaries, roads, trails, railroads, telephone lines, ranger stations, hotels, cabins and various other topographical features are shown.  
On the reverse of the sheet is printed an abstract of the Oregon game laws, extracts from state fire laws and statistics as to the population of cities and towns in Oregon.  
Maps similar to that of the Wallowa have been already issued by the forest service for the Crater and Oregon national forests of Oregon, and maps for other forests are in course of preparation.  
They are for the specific use of those who reside in, traverse, or do business with the individual national forest which is shown, and are obtainable from the resident supervisor.
