Keep on Building

While "things are slow" in most of the smaller Oregon towns, at least so far as the construction of new buildings is concerned, Bend seems to be keeping up a steady gait in substantial development in this line. A few weeks ago the Mutsig brick building was placed under way, and now comes the announcement of a new structure to cost in excess of \$12,000, on the southwest corner of Wall and Oregon streets.—Bend Bulletin.

Corn Growing Belt

D. M. Lowe reported to the Commercial Club Monday evening that he had made a canvass of the Rogue River Valley this year and that there was over 5,000 acres of corn being raised this year, as against less than 400 three years ago. Not only that, but he had with him a part of the time two Columbus, Ohio, agriculturists who estimated much of the corn at 60 bushels per acre. Even at 20 bushels per acre 100,000 bushels of home raised corn means much to a community which has been shipping in practically all that is used.—Ashland Tidings.

Ship Sheep East

The first shipment of sheep to the East this fall was made from Bend today, there being thirty-two cars, or a trainload. The shipper was Ewen McLennan, who has had them in the mountains during the summer. They went to Chicago. The sheep were driven in Monday and Tuesday, and are in the condition for marketing. There are about 7,500 of them, including many lambs.—Bend Bulletin.

A Good Habit, Too

The Riverside mill started sawing last Monday, and has been at it ever since. In fact, it begins to look as though sawing was soon to become a habit at the Riverside mill. We are all glad to see them in operation. The mill has a capacity of about 15,000 feet per day, and the managers hope to keep it running full blast as long as the weather will permit.—Chewaucan Press.

What Will Eugene Do?

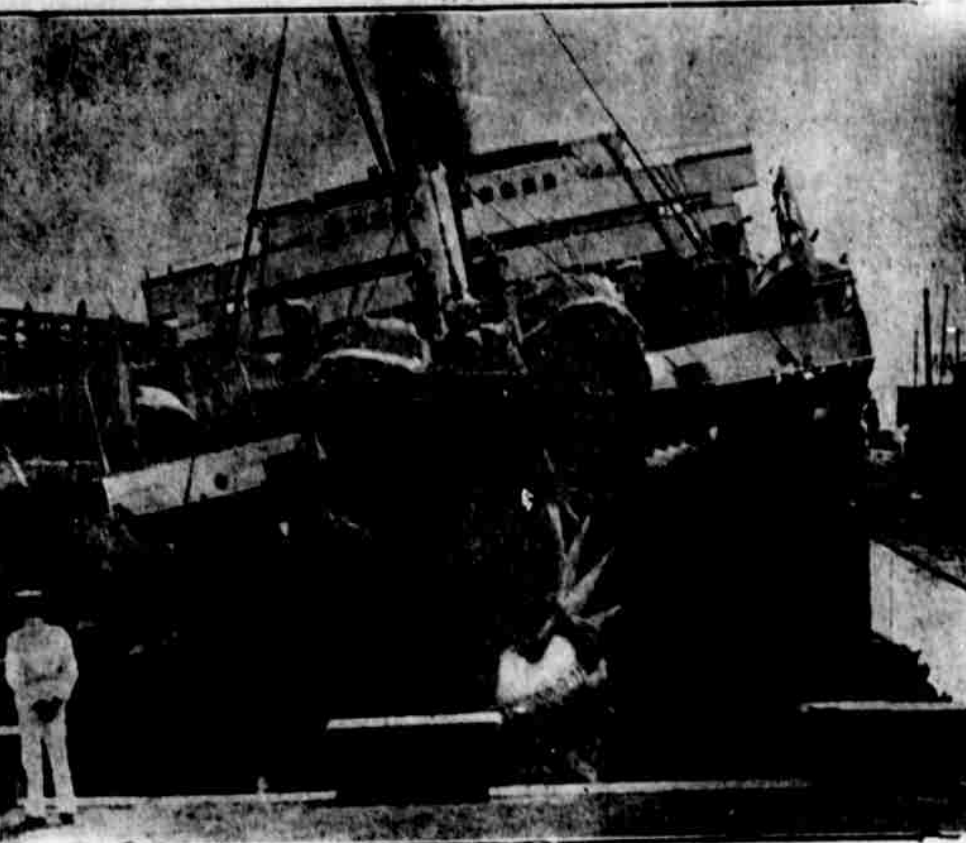

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Greatest Ship Listed After Fire in Hold



More than 1,000 steerage passengers were in a panic in the hold of the Imperator, the greatest ship in the world, when she caught fire at her pier in Hoboken, N. J. Flames broke

forth from a provision room, and the ship's crew, called to fight, attacked the flames. The second officer of the vessel lost his life. The steerage passengers, ordered from their quarters, fled in panic to the pier. The flames

raged for several hours, while tons of water were pumped into the hold. Although the vessel has a displacement of more than 60,000 tons, she took on so much water that it caused a list to starboard.

Suffs Campaigning in Missouri for Ballot

ST. LOUIS, Sept. 6.—With women to east of them and women to west of them permitted by vote, Missouri suffragists today are touring the state in a campaign for the vote. The speakers are led by Mrs. Walter McNab Miller. One of the features of the state-wide campaign is the circulation of petitions to get the required 22,000 signatures to secure a vote on the proposed amendment.

The equal suffrage bill passed the house at the last session of the assembly, but was smothered in the senate committee.

Suffragist leaders openly claimed that they had been "double crossed" by the upper body, for after the bill had been favorably reported to the senate and sufficient votes to pass it had been promised, the measure was mysteriously referred back to the committee on a technicality and a second hearing ordered. The women refused "to be made fools of," as they put it, by going into a second hearing, and the measure was pigeon-holed.

President Poincare to Attend Races
