FARMHAND HURT IN A RUNAWAY

IS AT A MERRILL FARM HOUSE IN A PRECARIOUS CONDITION—OTHER NEWS OF INTEREST TO MERRILLITES

MERRILL, Sept. 8.—Threatening winds and indications that the farmers in this vicinity would have their crops damaged to a great extent from rain have changed into a clear atmosphere.

Miss Emogene Ogden of Salem, Ore., is spending a few days in Merrill as the guest of Mr. and Mrs. Geo. R. Rudolph. Miss Ogden, it is understood, has been visiting relatives and friends in Klamath Falls since May 28th.

A newcomer, named Donnally, who is employed by Herbert Anderson on his farm near this city, is in a precarious condition, caused by injuries sustained while driving a team hitched to a header. The accident occurred last Wednesday at 11 o'clock. As near as can be ascertained, Donnally hitched the runaways to the implement, and in the act of starting the team became unmanageable, and pitched the unfortunate man between the barn and the header. The impact of the farm implement coming with much force against the barn crushed him badly. A few minutes after the accident the injured man was rushed to a neighboring farm house, and Dr. Patterson was notified. His lungs are ruptured, and he frequently is spitting blood. It is said that the chances for his recovery are uncertain.

Top Steers Only Are In Demand at Market

PORTLAND, Sept. 8.—Killers are surfeited on half fat cattle, and are shading their bids on such stuff, and only good steers are in demand. Most of the receipts for the week have been of the ordinary variety, so sales have ranged in price from \$6.75 to \$7.75, with 8c as extreme top for the very best grade. Feeders are in demand, and had good sale. A limited supply of cows and heifers has been received, with good demand, and prices in line with about a week ago, top grades going at \$6.35 to \$6.65, and an occasional bunch at \$6.75. A better outlet for bulls. Steady prices on prime light veal.

Receipts of hogs continue to come in bunches. A good sized run Monday with \$9.50 top for best light stuff. The price sagged to \$9.35 by Tuesday and Wednesday, the same holding for Friday, and the hog market can be quoted anywhere between \$9 and \$9.50, with the tendency downward.

The week started off with a brisk business in the sheep house, with a fair supply of both choice lambs and sheep. The strength had declined before the midweek, and buyers were hard to find for the few arrivals on the later stock trains. Sheep and lamb prices quoted steady with last week.

Whereas, Heretofore the grade on Crescent avenue, in the City of Klamath Falls, Oregon, from Alameda avenue to Nelson street, has been established by ordinance, proclamation and other legal methods of the Common Council; and,

Whereas, It is now deemed expedient to change the said grade to conform to specifications submitted by the city engineer;

Be it Resolved, That it is the intention of the Common Council of Klamath Falls, Oregon, to change the grade of said Crescent avenue, from Alameda to Nelson street, and that the said grade after this proposed change will be as follows:

Alameda, north side 190.9
Cross street, south side 195.9
Cross street, north side 194.9
Canby street, south side 202.5
Canby street, north side 203.5
Nelson street, south side 210.9
Nelson street, north side 211.9

And be it further Resolved, That this said resolution or a copy thereof be kept of record in the office of the police judge, and shall be published in the city official newspaper ten consecutive times, and within three days from the date of the first publication the city engineer shall cause to be posted in at least two places on said road affected by change of grade, proper notices of the proposed change and shall later file with the police judge an affidavit of posting of said notices.

Further notice is hereby given that at any time before twenty days after the first publication of this resolution the owners of more than one-half of the property affected by such change of grade may make and file with the police judge a written objection or remonstrance against the same.
