

THAW DEPORTED; IS RE-ARRESTED

Brandenburg Is Still in Office; Delzell Here Tonight

IS CARRIED FORCIBLY TO AUTO AND TAKEN TO AMERICAN SIDE OF LINE BY CANADIAN OFFICERS

FREEDOM ON UNITED STATES SOIL IS SHORT-LIVED FOR THE GILDED YOUTH

In endeavoring to get back into Canada, Thaw is arrested in New Hampshire by New York authorities—Effort will at once be made by Jerome to get extradition papers for taking prisoner.

COLEBROOK, N. H., Sept. 10.—Harry Kendall Thaw, slayer of Stanford White and fugitive from the Matteawan asylum for the criminal insane, was arrested here this morning.

He is being held for the New York authorities. Jerome is hastening here from Bennington.

Immigration officers at Coaticook, Quebec, rushed Thaw across the border this morning. Minister of Justice Doherty, who is acting minister of the interior, held that the deportation order of the recent immigration board was legal, and despite the order of the Montreal court, he instructed the officials to deport Thaw.

Thaw and his attorney were evidently awaiting the time to go to Montreal, when at 8 o'clock this morning, immigration officers appeared, dragged the prisoner away from his lodgings, and putting him in an auto, started for the border.

Thaw fought violently and continually screamed for help, declaring that he was being kidnapped.

The Canadian officials freed Thaw at Averill, Vermont. There was nobody there to arrest him, so Thaw hired an automobile and started northward, evidently intending to return to Canada, or to reach some hiding place.

Thaw's flight was stopped near Stewartson, when Sheriff Drew and Attorney Bernard Joseph of New York arrested him. Thaw was brought to this city shortly before noon.

He was taken to the office of a local attorney, from where he notified his friends of his arrest and detention.

Sheriff Drew will remain with Thaw until Jerome arrives. Efforts

will be started then to extradite the prisoner to New York.

A battery of Thaw attorneys is expected this afternoon to oppose extradition.

"This form of proceeding is outrageous," said Thaw this afternoon. "My Canadian lawyers evidently were not on the job."

"I can't see how the immigration officers could over-ride the courts, but they did. The case has been irregular throughout, but I hope to get justice in New Hampshire."

When asked why he came here Thaw said he lost his way.

Thaw has not been locked up, the sheriff having him in charge.

WILLIAMSTON, Mass., Sept. 10.—Attorneys Jerome and Kennedy left today for New Hampshire to try to extradite Harry Thaw.

"We'll hire a special train, if necessary, to get us to Colebrook this afternoon," said Jerome.

According to Kennedy, New York's requisition for Thaw is being prepared.

RITCHIE-WELCH FIGHT ALL OFF

FRIENDS HERE CONFIDENT OF APPOINTMENT

BRANDENBURG OUTLINES HIS POSITION

Although this is the day designated for the change in Postmasters in Klamath Falls, no notification has been received of the appointment by President or Senate—Delzell's appointment assured, say friends.

Although this is the day designated by the postoffice department for the relieving of Postmaster Clyde K. Brandenburg, at a late hour this afternoon there has been no official notification of the appointment of his successor.

Those who are in close touch with the Oregon delegation in the senate assert that both Chamberlain and Lane will urge the appointment of Delzell.

Some of these declare that he has been considered for the office ever since it was decided to remove Brandenburg.

Mr. Delzell is expected home this evening from Oklahoma City.

"It won't be necessary, as some would have the people of Klamath Falls believe," said Mr. Brandenburg this morning, "to bring the United States marshal here, or to call out the troops to remove me from office."

"I recognize the authority of the postmaster general to remove me from office and whenever my successor is appointed and confirmed, and I am instructed to turn over the office to him I shall do so without any unpleasantness."

"There is a great deal of difference between refusing to resign and refusing to vacate the office when ordered to do so. My record is clear, and my conduct of the office is beyond criticism, as is shown by the favorable reports of all of the inspectors."

"If the government desires a democrat in my position, I believe the officials have the authority to make the change, but the initiative is up to them."

EVELYN SAYS HE WILL SEEK HER HELP AT ONCE

THAW'S FORMER WIFE DENIES ANY FEAR

Says She is Awfully Sorry for Him, and That While She Doesn't Love Him as She Once Did, She Still Has a Deep Affection for Man Who Shot Gotham Architect—Declares He Will Turn to Her Soon.

NEW YORK, Sept. 10.—When she was informed that Harry Thaw had been deported from Canada, Evelyn Nesbit Thaw said:

"I am very sorry for Harry. Of course, I don't love him as I once did, but I still have a deep affection for him. When he realizes that he has been mistaken in his method of seeking his freedom, he will surely turn to me. I got him out of the first mess, and I can extricate him from this one. There is no truth in the reports that I am afraid of Harry."

SEVEN BODIES FOUND IN SEA

GERMAN TORPEDO BOATS ARE SCOURING NORTH SEA FOR ZEPPELIN AIRSHIP LOST IN STORM

BERLIN, Sept. 10.—Torpedo boats at noon reported recovering the bodies of seven members of the crew in the Zeppelin military dirigible balloon, which was blown to sea in yesterday's storm.

There are eight members of the crew missing.

Kaiser Wilhelm has ordered all of the torpedo fleet in the White Sea to assist in the search.

Work of Deepening and Widening Adams Canal Will be Let to the Farmers in Smaller Subdivisions

The work of deepening and widening the Adams canal near Merrill is to be done by the farmers in that section, instead of the government, according to Engineer B. E. Hayden, in charge of operation and maintenance for the reclamation service.

"We are now preparing notices for bids," said Hayden this morning, and we expect to have the water users take up this work as soon as the harvest is completed.

"Following the harvest, there is a dull season on the farms, and we feel that this work will make this dull time on the farm profitable. The job will be divided into small schedules, and each man can bid on as many schedules as he feels he can take care of."

The reclamation service will establish a camp at Adams Point. From there it will supervise the work being done, and will do all the necessary blasting and rock work.

Judge Van Fleet Excoriates and Removes From Panel Juror Who Says He Voted Against Opinion

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 10.—Federal District Judge Van Fleet this morning postponed until Monday the sentencing of Drew Caminetti, convicted of violating the Mann white slave act.

The trial of Maurey F. Diggs and Attorney Harris for subornation of perjury was immediately started.

Judge Van Fleet dismissed from the panel, after a fierce exhortation, William Heister, one of the Caminetti case jurors, who recently made the following statement to a newspaper representative:

"I voted to find Caminetti guilty to save his father and mother a lot of useless counsel fees, and because

the other jurors insisted on a compromise. I regard the verdict as a disgrace to the United States. I believe it should be reversed because the young man is innocent of the charge."

Attorneys for the government are considering the advisability of having Heister punished for contempt of court.

"Why did you vote contrary to your opinion?" asked the court.

"Because you told me so," said Heister.

Charles Clausen, who was quoted similarly, declared that the panel had misquoted him. Judge Van Fleet reproved the intemperate language of the case with anybody, but did not remove Clausen from the panel.
