Build Own Roads
Again the county court has rejected the bids for the improvement of the road in the Pass Creek canyon, and will begin work at once rebuilding that road under the direction and plans of County Engineer Germond. Among the reasons for rejecting the bids is that the lowest bidder asked about ten months' time in which to complete the work, whereas it is almost imperative that the work be done before another winter.—Roseburg Review.

That Ashland can furnish better fruits and vegetables than can be raised south of the Siskiyou is becoming more and more apparent every day. Ashland has for some time been supplying green corn for the Southern Pacific dining car service, and another proof of the superiority of Ashland vegetables and fruits was shown a few days ago. Superintendent Metcalf of the Shasta division of the S. P. was here with his private car, and chanced to visit the Ashland market. He was so well pleased that he not only bought the entire load of one farmer, but bought a large amount from others, all of which he had the farmer deliver at the depot for the use of his official car, Shasta.—Ashland Tidings.

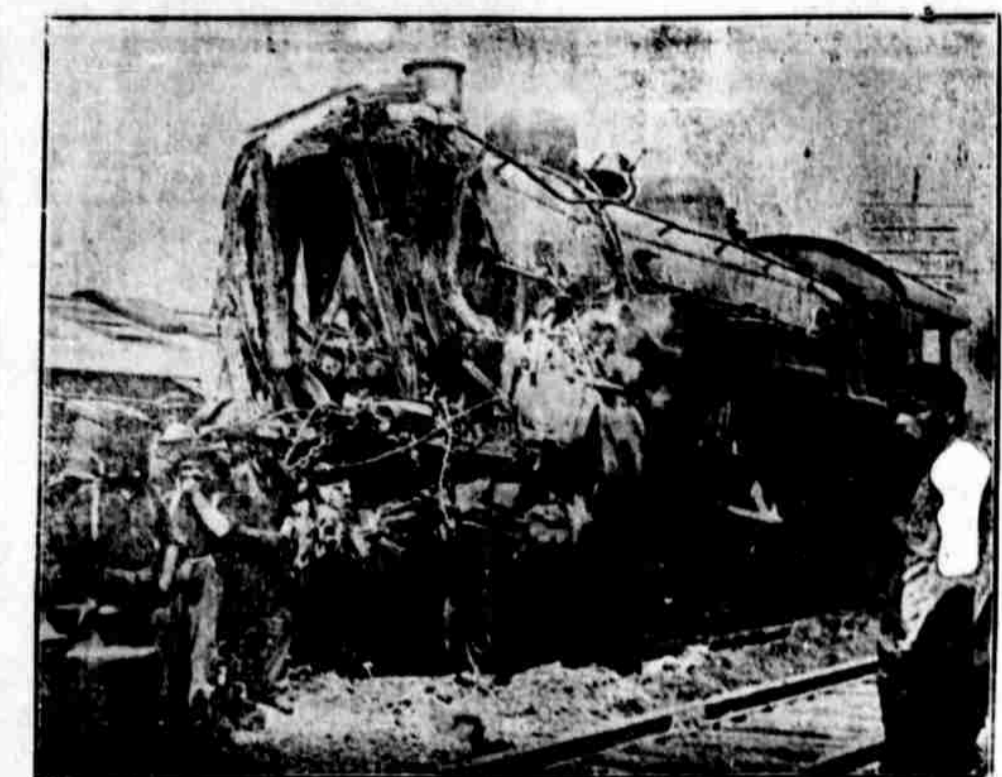

Locomotive of White Mountain Express After the Collision



The locomotive of the White Mountain express of the New Haven railroad plunged into the rear sleeping cars of the Bar Harbor express at Wallingford, four miles from New Haven. Many were killed and more injured. The locomotive was a heavy one, such as is used on mountain roads in the West. In fact, it was a duplicate of the locomotive which on June 12 smashed into a sleeping car at Stamford, killing six.
In the foreground is seen the debris of two sleeping cars. They were smashed to bits, and most of those occupying them were killed or badly hurt.
