DENVER GIRLS HAVE BIGGEST FEET

Shoes Under Size 4 Are Left on the Shelves

United Press Service DENVER, Colo., Sept. 13.—Denver women have the biggest feet in the country. The distinction used to be enjoyed by the women of Chicago—at least, so the rest of the world said. But now Denver has wrested the distinction from Chicago women. It was right that this should be so. The Chicago women were ashamed of their big feet. Denver women are proud of theirs.

Miss Clara Houston's foot is typical of the Denver size and shape. Miss Houston says hers is a perfect foot. She is a chiropodist, and therefore she ought to know.

Miss Houston's foot is nine inches long, nine inches around the ball, and nine inches around the instep. Its owner says a woman's foot should be one-seventh of her height, and Den-

ver shoe dealers say their customers' feet usually conform to these dimensions.

"The only sizes of women's shoes we ever have left over," said one local dealer, "are those smaller than No. 4. Of this sort we have a big stock. We are trying to sell them off at bargain prices. They are good shoes, and we are willing to sell them for a mere song, but Denver women can't use 'em. They're too small for the Denver foot. We are hoping for an influx of visitors who need shoes and have small feet."

Denver women's feet, though large, are more slender than Southern or Eastern women's pedal extremities. Southern women generally wear EE's and think it a disgrace to call for a size larger than a No. 3. The women here wear A's, B's and

C's. That woman you see over there takes a No. 6; the one beside her wears a No. 5 1/2, and that ruddy-cheeked, healthy looking girl just entering the store wears a No. 7, and she's still growing. That's about how the sizes run here.

"It's the altitude that makes the women's feet here so large. After women from a lower altitude have been here for a while they have to get their shoes a size or so larger. It hurts 'em—not physically, but in their pride—to have to do it, but they finally come to it. Denver women walk more. That enlarges their feet. And take it from me—one who is in the know—the owners of Denver feet so far as women are concerned, are sturdier, more athletic, healthier and more cheerful than the owners of feet in other localities.

OUR WEEKLY SERMON

"The Gospel for Every Creature"

By R. J. S. Stubblefield, Pastor First Presbyterian Church

"Go ye into all the world, and preach the gospel to every creature." Mark 16:15.

Why did the Master say: "Preach the gospel to every creature?" Because every creature needs the gospel. There is not one so wise or so ignorant, so rich or so poor, as to not need the gospel. God made man, and he knew man's needs. He also made the gospel and put something into it to fit the needs of every man.

The people of the apostolic age were very much aware of the fact that they needed something. They did not know just what. Some thought they needed new rulers, and yet others thought that what was most needed was a new philosophy, but all who accepted the gospel found that it contained precisely what they most needed.

The people of this generation feel that something is lacking, that there is a deep need in the soul of man which is not being satisfied. What do we need? Where shall we find something to meet our deepest needs? A few years ago most any public speaker could tell just what was needed, only they did not agree among themselves. The only thing they could not agree upon was that times were badly out of joint, and something was needed. Some thought political reform was what was needed. Others thought social reform

would meet our deepest needs. Now we are not so sure about what is needed. We only know we need something. There is a bitter cry going up from the soul which comes from some deep need of the soul.

What we really need is that which will enable us to get the most out of the life we live, and to accomplish the most with the life which our Creator has given us. These two propositions are one. The person who makes the best use of his life will get the most out of his life. No one can use the life which his Creator has given him to good advantage so long as he is out of harmony with his Creator. The knowledge of the discordant note in modern life, brought forth that much used evangelistic phrase, "get right with God," and here is the fundamental need. The person who is right with God will soon get right with his fellowmen.

The gospel was given for the purpose of meeting the soul's deepest need of getting right with God. The Master said it should be preached to every creature, because it meets the deepest need of the soul of every creature. It is for the old and the young, for the rich and the poor, for the upright and the ignorant.

The gospel fits the needs of every mood, whether bright or dark, joyful or sorrowful. God made it for every creature in every condition of life.
