INCREASE OF QUACKERS ON THE RESERVATION CALLS ATTENTION TO DECREASE IN SALMON. OTHER NEWS

KLAMATH AGENCY, Sept. 12.—There will be more ducks this fall than last year. Word to this effect is brought in by sportsmen from all parts of the reservation. The marshes are "alive" with ducks.

Telegraph Cable 62 Years Old

WASHINGTON, D. C., Sept. 13.—With gigantic navy wireless towers at Arlington, Va., humming messages that are picked out of the air thousands of miles away by ships and wireless stations on land, navy officials and scientists today remembered that just sixty-two years ago the first successful cable was completed between England and France. The great station at Arlington already has communicated directly with Gibraltar, Eiffel tower, Guantanamo and Cuba. The station is in daily communication with the last two mentioned places.

EFFETE FRENCH FOOTPAD WILL START SIX YEAR TERM—AUTHORITIES SAY HE IS EITHER CRAZY OR CLEVER

PARIS, Sept. 13.—His last hope of appeal gone, France's famous "superman" footpad and "poet" today began his term of six years imprisonment.

Jean Michelon is his name. He sandbagged a woman and robbed her of \$700, but when betrayed by a friend, spouted an ode to the sun before the police.

"I may be a crook," he said, "but I am an ideal man, I am a superman. I crack a lady on the head, I grab her coin and run; but any dub that has no bed can touch me for the moon!"

The authorities are divided over whether Michelon is crazy or clever.

THREE YACHTS WILL BE BUILT
