The game was what is known in ultra-fashionable circles as a "hum-dinger," with much emphasis on the "dinger"—one of the Garrison British kind, where the winners come from behind in the last half of the ninth and grab a victory right out from under the score keeper's pencil.

In the last half of the sixth the substitutes touched a match to the fireworks, and when the smoke cleared away four runners had crossed the rubber.

Hunsacker smacked one square on the seam, and never stopped running till he reached third, Huff and Waters scoring. E. Pike poled out a single that scored Hunsacker; Chilton popped one up to White, and Pike was doubled at first.

PRESSED STONE WORK PLEAS

ARTIFICIAL STONE BEING USED IN COURT HOUSE CONSTRUCTION, IS ALSO BEING USED AT LOS ANGELES

L. M. Schofield, the artificial stone man, who is furnishing the stone for the new court house, returned last night from Los Angeles, where he went to look after the setting of the stone on the new state armory building.

The Los Angeles papers state that their new armory building will be the most magnificent building of its kind west of the Mississippi River. In regard to the stone used in the building the Express says:

"The artificial stone manufactured by L. M. Schofield for the state armory building is an improvement on both marble and granite. Under test it shows a resistance greater than granite, and in appearance is far superior to marble."

Mr. Schofield stated to a Herald representative this morning that the stone his concern was turning out for the new court house was the best in quality and appearance the company had ever produced.

United Press Service HARTFORD, Conn., Sept. 15.—Governor Baldwin of Connecticut is a firm believer in "clean marriage laws" and suffrage for women. To the United Press he said he considers Washington's "clean marriage law" all right in its way, but he believes the Washingtonians started their campaign in the wrong place. "The church ought to take up sex hygiene first," said Governor Baldwin today. "Then it should be taken up in the schools. Then the legislature ought to be heard from by passing laws to aid the fight."
