OUR WEEKLY SERMON

"DIVINE AUTHORITY" By ELDER E. S. D. HARLAN, Pastor Christian Church

Matt. 21:23—"By what authority doest thou these things. Jesus has been doing some wonderful things on this his last visit to Jerusalem. He has cleansed the temple of merchantmen and cursed the fig tree, but the most important transaction to the Scribes and Pharisees was his triumphal entry into the Holy City, recorded in this chapter. So it seems most natural that they should come to the Master with the question of our text.

Z. T. Sweeney says: "Authority is of two kinds: First, primary authority, which grows out of the relation of those who have the right to command those whose duty it is to obey. Second, delegated authority, which can be given to another by the party holding primary authority." God, our Creator and Preserver, is the primary authority in religion. He appears to Abram saying (Gen. 17:1): "I am almighty God." As power he here appears to rebellious and undisciplined man. To Israel God says (Ex. 20:6): "I will show mercy to thousands of them that keep my commandments." And after 4,000 years of human history, Jehovah reveals himself as "Love" and "Our Father" through his son Jesus, who should save his people from sin.

The Father then delegates all authority to his Son (Matt. 28:19-20): "All authority is given unto me in heaven and earth; (Heb. 1:1): "God having of old time spoken unto the fathers by the prophets * * * hath in the end of these days spoken unto us in his Son." Christ is the image of the invisible God. "He that hath seen me hath seen the Father."

Moses, new from the presence of

the Lord, veiled his face to speak to Israel, which veil is done away in Christ (11 Cor. 3:13-15). Christ represents the Father's power. Power and force are different. Force is represented in the thunderbolt that cleaves the heavens, shatters the mighty trees, etc. Power is represented by electricity under control, propelling cars, machinery and ships. There is a blending of weakness and power throughout Master's life. In weakness he was born in a stable, while in power he was escorted by angels to earth. In weakness he died on the cross, but in power he is raised up of the Father. Let us learn the lessons of Christ, our great teacher. His every word was weighty with life, and his every example full of inspiration. Believe his teachings, obey his commands, build hope's temple on his promises, and by his warnings keep from danger.

Before leaving this world Christ authorized his apostles to preach his Gospel to every creature. In transfer of authority from Father to Son there was no danger of error or mistakes, for their mutual understanding was perfect. The apostles were human and imperfect, and lest they should err, Christ promised, "I will send you the Comforter * * * who will guide you into all truth." As Jesus represented God so the apostles (spirit guided) gave Christ's will to the sons of men, for "he that receiveth you, receiveth Me * * * and also him that sent me." Through inspired men the will of Christ becomes "the perfect law of liberty"; nothing to be added or taken away, "that the man of God may be perfect thoroughly furnished unto every good work."
