

BRYAN SAYS HE WILL LECTURE

WASHINGTON, D. C., Sept. 20.—Secretary of State Bryan today declared that he intends to continue lecturing just as long as he wishes to.

He is highly angered at the reports that he intended to cancel his dates because of criticism.

"This evening I will deliver the last lecture of the season," he said. "My total income from lectures this year has been a little over \$7,000. My net receipts, after deducting expenses, are a little over \$5,000."

Anti-Alcoholists in Session

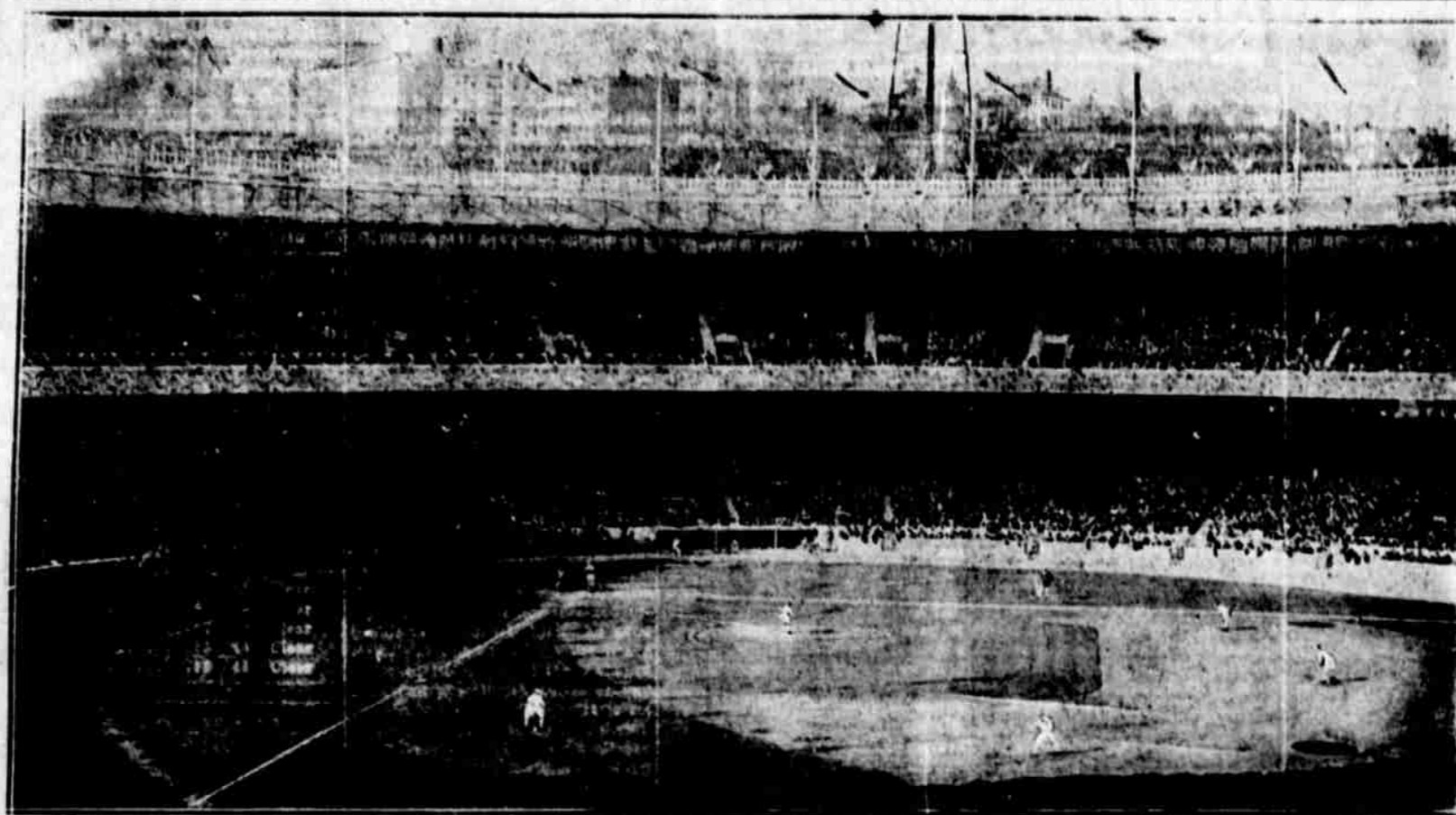

PREMIUM LIST FOR FAIR COMPLETED

Animals offered for sale have, within twelve months prior to such sale, been submitted to a tuberculin test and received a certificate of health from a qualified veterinarian. Any person who exhibits or permits the exhibition of an animal in violation of the provisions of this section, and any person who violates any other provision of this section shall be fined not less than \$50 nor more than \$250.

Exhibitors will please read and take notice of the above law and arrange with the secretary to have the above test made.

Unsound animals will not be awarded premiums. Judges will in no case award a premium where there is no merit, and in case there be but one article or animal exhibited in a division or class, they will award only one premium in a division—the highest, or a second, or a third premium, as may be proper.

Premiums may, in the discretion of the board, be awarded on exhibits not mentioned in this list.
