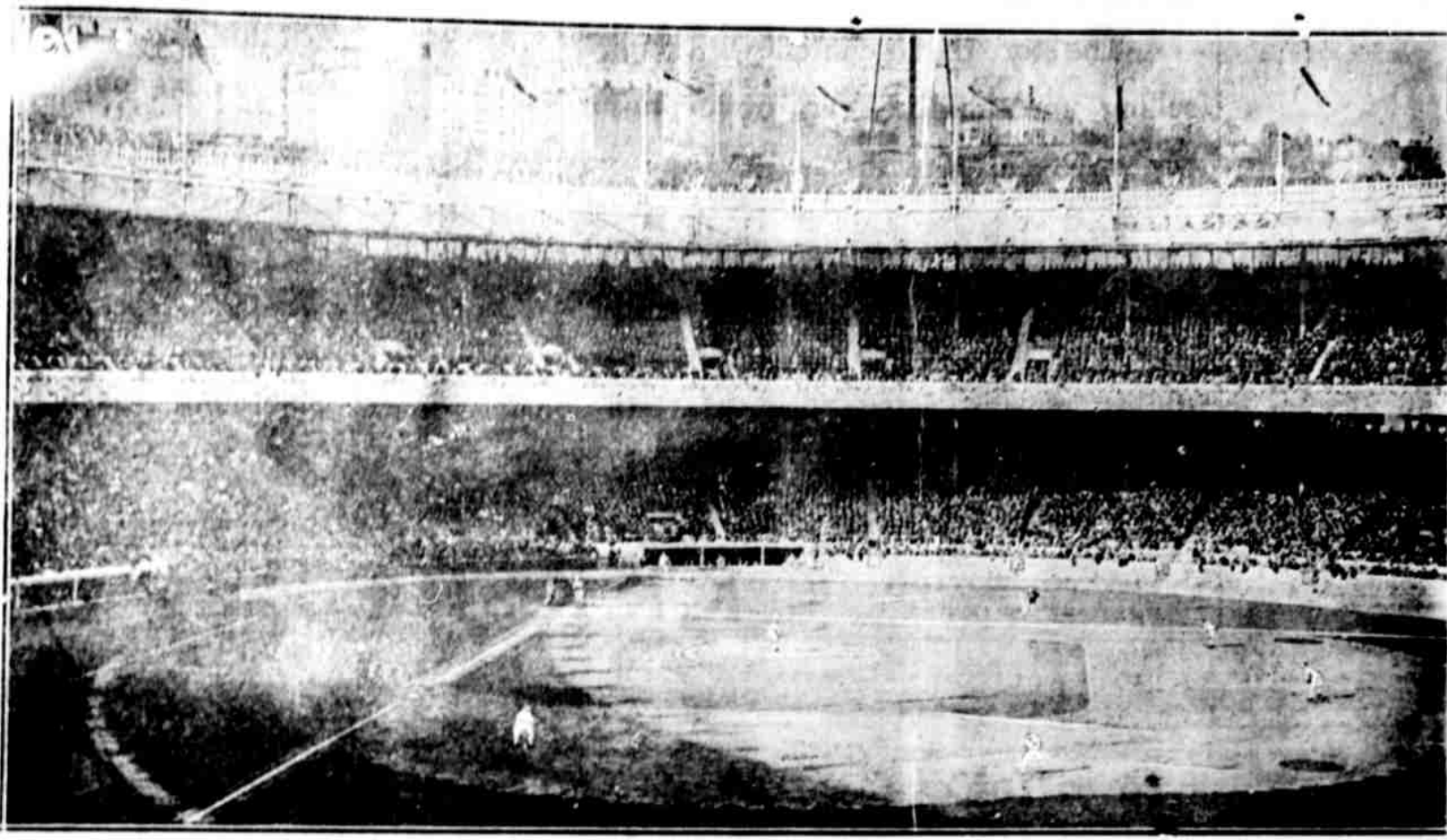

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 6.—Long-time loans to California farmers on easy terms is the alleged object of a "credit corporation" which opened for business here today.
Its eleven directors are prominent business and professional men of San Francisco and other California cities. In addition to these directors it has behind it an advisory committee of fifty, of whom thirty-nine are well known bankers.
The corporation, it was announced, will make long-term loans to farmers which, however, the farmers may have option of paying back any time before the loan expires. The money for the loans will be raised by issuing bonds against the mortgages and
