RAILROADS ARE REBATING, CHARGE

UNITED STATES COMMENCES AN
INVESTIGATION OF CHARGES
MADE AGAINST RAILROADS IN CO-
RADO

PUEBLO, Colo., Oct. 6.—Whether certain railroads of Colorado gave free transportation, either state or interstate, to influence shippers is the point on which the rebating trials of the railroads and shippers, which opened here today, will decide.

The government expects to prove that the Denver & Rio Grande and Colorado & Southern railroads regulated the issue of their passes so that large shippers were favored in this respect.

The Portland Cement company and the Victor American Fuel company in the same cases are charged with having accepted rebates and favors of this nature. The government's witnesses will be employees of the companies involved.

The trials are the result of an inquiry by the Interstate Commerce Commission into the abuse of passes given by Colorado railroads last spring. It was then that hundreds of free tickets were given to shippers and that politicians openly solicited passes. Some judges, including some of the state supreme bench, were alleged to have requested or accepted such favors.
