HEALTH AND FINANCE

THIS is an age which places an ever-increasing emphasis on the relation of good health to individual hygiene, to social effectiveness, to general prosperity. The race is to the community whose children thrive and whose workers keep well. Human health is a purchasable commodity, as has been demonstrated in Cuba, Panama and the Philippines. New York city, with its advanced hygiene and comprehensive system of money to strike example to other communities can do in the way of a radical reduction in infant mortality and in the general death rate.

Yakima county, Washington, is another example showing the results of systematic health work and liberal expenditure in a rural district. In twelve months under a full time health officer, with a well equipped laboratory and a corps of visiting nurses and sanitary inspectors, the death rate in the county from typhoid fever was reduced from 128 per 100,000 to 16, and the deaths from all causes fell from 538 in 1911 to 292 in 1912.

The mayor of Colorado Springs said recently to the delegates of the American Public Health Association that the problems of public health are even more vital than those of individual health. Appreciation of this fact comes slowly. Money to purchase public health is given grudgingly by those in charge of the public purse.

Citizens of every community should awake to the fact that community health is a first principle of effective local government, and should adopt for their slogan, Public Health is a Purchasable Commodity.

FAMOUS MURDER TRIAL STARTS

Courtroom Crowded With Cosmopolitan Audience

Jewish Hatred Evident by the Russian Government

KIEFF, Oct. 8.—After lying in jail for two years and a half, Mendel Bellis was placed on trial today in the criminal section of the Kieff district court for "ritual murder." On account of the extraordinary interest the case has attracted throughout Europe, the court room was packed by a cosmopolitan throng when Judge Hoidkyeff and his associates mounted the bench and began the impaneling of a jury.

More than 200 newspaper men from various countries had previously applied for seats. Conspicuous among the reporters was a personal representative of M. Stecheglovitoff, minister of justice, who had been instructed to wire a running detail account of the proceedings to his chief in St. Petersburg.

From the inception of the case the ministry of justice had carefully directed the activities of the local prosecutors, Brandorf and Chaplinsky, and it was with the full approval of the central government that the charge of "ritual murder" was made in the original indictment.

Ever since the morning of April 1, 1911, when the mutilated body of Andrei Muschinsky, a 12-year-old Christian boy, was found in an abandoned brick yard just outside Kieff, the prosecution has been endeavoring to establish the theory that he was slain in accordance with an alleged Jewish rite prescribed by the Talmud, so that his blood might be used in making passover bread. The government has apparently done all it could to foster this idea.

M. Krassovsky, chief of the Kieff detective department, was actually instructed to proceed on the theory that the crime was the work of Jews, although the only possible pretext for the "ritual" charge was that the boy's body bore 47 stab wounds. According to current superstition the "ritual murder" is accomplished by 45 wounds. He could obtain absolutely no evidence along the required lines, but on the contrary believed he had traced the murder to a gang of thieves.

When Krassovsky made his first report to his superiors he was sternly reprimanded. Later he was practically forced by them to arrest Mendel Bellis, a Jew, 40 years of age, foreman of the brick yard. On producing further evidence indicating the guilt of the thieves and the innocence of Bellis, Krassovsky was dismissed from office.

When a fresh investigation was made under the direction of his successor, M. Mischouk, he and his assistants quickly came to the conclusion that the ritual murder theory was fantastically untrue, and so reported to the authorities. The result was not only the dismissal of Mischouk and two of his men, but their arrest on charges of "fabricating documents favorable to the Jews."

In order to strengthen its case, the government caused widespread publication of a statement made to the examining magistrate by the Arch-mandrite Ambrosius, vicar of the Orthodox monastery at Kieff, to the effect that two monks, proselyted from the Jewish faith, had minutely described to him the practice of "ritual murder."

His testimony was supported by Prof. Sikorsky of St. Vladimir University at Kieff, who held that the nature of Yushinsky's wounds gave every indication of "ritual murder," that the boy manifestly had been tortured before death, and that several persons were probably party to the crime.

As further emphasizing the attitude of the government, the chief of the Odesa section, who openly attacked Prof. Sikorsky's contentions, was dismissed from his post.

In the meantime the case had attracted world-wide attention. Many prominent men in England, including the archbishops of Canterbury and York, Lord Rosebery, Austen Chamberlain, A. J. Halibur, and scores of university professors, scientists and ministers of the gospel, signed and sent out to Russia a strongly worded protest against the "blood accusation."

The direct evidence against Bellis, so far as it has been disclosed, is of rather a flimsy character. First there was a statement by a lamplighter named Shakhowsky, who declared that Eugene told him a few days later that he and Yushinsky had been driven from the brick works by a man with a black beard.

Shakhowsky's wife deposed that an acquaintance, Anna Zakharovaya, told her that she saw Bellis seize Yushinsky and drag him toward the brick yard kiln. Ann Zakharovaya, however, flatly denies this.

Vassily Cheberiak, Eugene's father, stated that a week before the murder his son told him that two Jews, wearing unusual garb, had taken up their residence with Bellis, and that he had seen them praying. Unfortunately, Eugene, who had been sickly, died before his evidence could be taken by the examining magistrate, or the mystery might have been cleared up.

Later, Ivan Kosatshenko, a convict reformer, who was placed in the same cell with Bellis for two months, declared that Bellis arranged with him to poison all the witnesses against him, and promised that if he did so the Jews would keep him in comfort for life.

Throughout the various preliminary processes of the case the defense has been seriously handicapped by the manifest prejudices of the court officials against the prisoner. All possible obstacles were thrown in the way of defense counsel.

His first attorney, Grigorovitch, was severely reprimanded and temporarily suspended from the case for having signed a petition protesting against the "blood accusation." His next lawyer, Margoulin, was forced out by reason of a palpably false charge made by Vera Cheberiak, mother of the boy Eugene, that he had attempted to bribe her. Bellis was today represented in court by an array of counsel employed by rich Jews, chief of whom were two of the leading barristers of the capital, Karavevsky and Grusenberg.

Nation's Bankers Are Gathered in Convention

BOSTON, Oct. 8.—With prominent bankers and financiers attending from all parts of the country, the thirty-ninth annual convention of the American Bankers' Association was formally organized today. First Vice President Arthur Reynolds called the gathering to order, President Chas. H. Huttig of St. Louis having died last July.

Addresses of welcome were delivered by the mayor of Boston and Thomas P. Deal, president of the Boston clearing house and chairman of the local executive committee for the convention. Today's business session consisted chiefly of the reading of reports by General Secretary Fred E. Farnsworth, New York; Treasurer J. Fletcher Parrell, Chicago; General Counsel Thomas B. Paton, New York; Thomas J. Davis, Cincinnati, chairman of the executive council, and the secretary of the standing protective committee. A H. Hepburn of New York, read the report of the currency committee, one of the most important committees of the association.

Reports from representatives of the different sections and the report on the constitutional revision by Robert E. James of Boston, Va., were read at this afternoon's session.
