"WIRELESS EYE" SAYS ASHLANDERS LATEST SAFETY SHOULD BOOST K.F.

SAN FRANCISCO OPERATOR BELIEVES HE HAS SOLVED THE QUESTION FOR OCEAN-GOING STEAMSHIPS

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 10.—If the "wireless eye" does all that M. C. Blum says it will do, navigation is on the eve of just such another revolution as it experienced in the discovery of the wireless telegraph, in the opinion of seafaring men who have examined the "eye" with which its inventor, S. Spitz, is experimenting at Vallejo. Blum and W. E. Rode are financing the invention, and have taken out twenty-seven patents on it. The instrument, which works only at night, reflects on a mirror a moving picture of everything within a radius of several miles. It receives its impression from a web of wires erected on a tall mast. It is useless by daylight, however, for the reason that the wires register only the "astral" rays.

"The navigator of a ship so equipped could see on the darkest night the surface of the ocean all about him," said Blum. "He could observe other ships approaching or the proximity of rocks, shoals or icebergs. A coast guard could see an enemy's scouts approaching long before the scouts had found what they were seeking."

TREATMENT ACCORDED ASHLAND FRUIT STORE AND THE RICH COUNTRY HERE INDICATES GREAT FUTURE

(From the Ashland Record)

A. C. Geinger of Ashland, who is at Klamath Falls developing a market for Rogue River fruit, writes as follows to this paper:

"Nearly every Sunday I ride out in my car in a different direction to study conditions. Thirty miles south of here, through Merrill to Malin, is a valley about twenty-five miles long by twenty wide, and level as a floor. With irrigation ditches in every direction, nearly every foot can be irrigated. I have traveled through a good many farming districts, but this beats them all for alfalfa, wheat, oats and barley. The farmers have some of the finest stock in the land.

"Out toward Bonanza, a distance of twenty-five miles, most of the land is dry farming, but some is under government ditch. They raise fine crops of wheat, barley and rye, but principally cattle and sheep. The farmers are prosperous—it takes only four or five steers to furnish a farmer's living for a year.

"Around Bly, about forty-five miles from here, they do not raise much grain or hay for market, but feed between 10,000 and 20,000 cattle and between 40,000 and 50,000 sheep.

"Along the route to Fort Klamath, a distance of about forty miles along the lake, there are four or five saw-mills, employing 2,000 men, several government and road camps, Indian agency and reservation. Every Indian seems to have money and likes to spend it.

"I am telling you these things just to show the people of Ashland the rich country there is around Klamath Falls and the amount of fruit we can sell when our goods are established. These people need fruit. Nearly everybody in this country knows what Ashland fruit and canned goods are, but heretofore were able to get but a limited supply—and that at such high

prices that most people could not afford to buy.

"I have opened up a branch house here for the Ashland Fruit and Produce Association, and have sold about two carloads of fruit per week since peaches were ripe. I could have sold three a week if the farmers had known we were here. There are at least fifteen cars of canned goods consumed here yearly, and Ashland sells about one.

"You can hear farmers here boasting for the Ashland Fruit House. Now that helps Ashland, and in return Ashland people should boost for Klamath Falls produce—and if Ashland people have opportunity to send home seekers into this country they should do it, as they will need fruit from Ashland. The more people here the better for Ashland growers and business men.

"I represent the growers of Ashland. The more money they make the more money they will have to spend with the merchants of Ashland. Every merchant should boost for the Ashland Fruit Association and cany-on, and help it establish a market here. This branch house has not cost the growers a cent for operation this summer. I have made my expenses handling vegetables and groceries and other goods. We have one of the largest stores in Klamath Falls, doing a good business—which is a credit both to Klamath Falls and to Ashland.
